HURTS PENDLETON

FALSE REPORTS PUBLISHED
ON LABOR CONDITIONS.

Someone Working for the Spokesman-Review Must Have a Grudge at This City—The Exaggerated Flood Reports Damaged the City and Now This Adds Insult to Injury.

The report published in the Spokesman-Review, to the effect that business has stagnated at Pendleton, carpenters and builders are idle, and things are at a standstill, generally, will cause many a smile of pity for the ignorance or dishonesty of the correspondent who sent out such a report from here.

The fact is, not an idle man is to be found in Pendleton, and there is more building in progress right now than at any period in the history of the city, since the Court street blocks were erected some seven and eight years ago.

Fully a quarter of a million dollars are now being expended in elegant new buildings, every brick mason, carpenter, plumber, painter and other building tradesman is busy at living wages, with the heaviest siege of building for the season yet to come, in the construction of three new school houses.

Such reports as the following hurt a city with strangers who do not know the actual conditions, and the damage done to Pendleton by reports of Pendleton's destructive flood, and this utterly false report on building conditions cannot be computed.

The Spokesman-Review, which evidently "has it in" for Pendleton strong, says:

"A large per cent of Pendleton's carpenters and joiners are out of employment owing to the falling off of building. The prospects in the spring were better than they had ever been before, but for some various reasons very little of the proposed work has been carried out. Several buildings have been postponed on account of the local option law being passed."

"Carpenters are leaving town every day, some going to Portland, some to Boise, but the majority are going to Walla Walla, at which place work is plentiful."

"With the prospects of the two large school houses to be erected soon, the two brick blocks now being constructed and numerous cottages planned, there will be plenty of employment in all of the branches of the building trades as soon as cool weather comes."

TORTURED HIS WIFE.

Inhuman Texan Burns a Man's Name on Woman's Flesh.

Houston, Texas, Aug. 6.—Two weeks ago Monroe Rogers left here on a business trip to salt Lake while his pretty young wife went to visit her sister.

On his return Rogers escorted her home. There he procured a quantity of rope, entered his wife's room and overpowering her tied her hands and feet and then gagged her.

Removing her clothing, he suspended her by the feet with a rope looped through the transom of a door. He then lighted a lamp and secured an old file 12 inches long. He held the file over the oil blaze until it was red hot and began burning the fiery letters of a man's name upon her. Smoke and the fumes of the burning flesh filled the house. He started on the bare shoulder and wrote down the arm to the wrist.

The letters were not small, being two to three inches in size, and the name, with 13 letters, was spelled out in full. Between each letter he would stop and repeat the instrument. Nearly half the night was consumed in the torture. The suffering woman could do no more than to utter smothered cries and writhe with pain.

The work of branding completed, the husband jerked the gags from her mouth and left the house. Her cries were sufficient to bring assistance and she was liberated and physicians summoned. SOUTHERN COLONIZATION.

Eight Million Acres Will Be Reclaimed Along Texas Gulf Coast.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 6.—For the purpose of colonizing the railroad and other cheap lands of the Southwest country with a healthy class of immigrants from the East and abroad, the colonization companies to co-operate with the railroads are being organized to finance and handle such land enterprises.

One of the recently organized companies is the Southwestern Colonization Company, with a capital of \$500,000, which will co-operate with the Frisco system and other roads in Texas, notably the St. Louis, Brownsville & Mexico. The colonization company will aid in developing a tract of about 8,000,000 acres of land lying along the gulf coast, and which will be sold at prices ranging from \$3 to \$5 per acre.

GOULDS' NEW ROAD.

Western Maryland Terminals at Baltimore About Complete.

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 6.—The Western Maryland railroad announces that it will have its terminal lines in Baltimore completed by the first of the coming month. The Goulds have spent more than \$1,000,000 on the work and before the contemplated improvements are finished more than \$3,000,000 will be spent.

The opening of this line will give the 268 miles of railroad of the Western Maryland proper access to the harbor front at once. At present this is obtained over the tracks of the Union railroad, controlled by the Pennsylvania.

THE SLED BOAT.

Ingenious Combination Devised by the Fire Island Life Savers.

The life savers attached to Uncle Sam's stations on Fire Island encountered great difficulties and dangers in crossing the Great South bay to the Long Island shore, either by water craft or ice craft. Still, naturally enough, they had a longing to visit family and friends when the great island sea was choked with drift ice or partly frozen over. These ingenious people long ago realized the needs of a vehicle capable of traveling on either ice or water safely, and years ago they launched the first "scooter," a boat constructed to travel on both ice and in water. It was a small boat, made fast to a sled, which was pushed on the ice and rowed on the water. This crude mode of travel, with the wind against or across the boat, made the trip one of tremendous exertion. In the course of time a sail was tried, at first square rigged and very small, but it was used only when the wind was fair. Then a special boat was built which was partially decked, and the sled was made lighter until at last the scooter of the present day came about, with nothing left of the sled but the bottom of the runners, shod with iron, or better still, as experience has shown, with brass. And so has developed the wonderful scooter of the Long Island lakes and bays, a swift leech that will sail in the water and from one element to the other quickly without a jar. Exchange.
