DEVELOP OREGON

POSSIBILITIES FOR POWER IN GRAND RONDE.

Minam River is One of Most Beautiful Streams in the State and One of Its Many Waterfalls Will Be Harnessed for an Electric Plant—One Thousand Carloads of Produce Can Be Handled by New Line of Road.

The Minam river, which heads in the high granite mountains, between Cornucopia and Wallowa, is one of the most beautiful mountain streams in the west, containing a number of high, sheer falls, which would furnish millions of horse power, if utilized.

The stream is hidden away in a deep mountain canyon, the only access to it being by pack horses, except on rare instances, where a rough wagon road leads down the precipitous bluffs.

At one of these beautiful waterfalls about eight miles north of the Cove, on the Union county side of the Wallowa-Union county line, the Eastern Oregon Development Company, of which W. E. Davidson of this city is secretary, will install a monster power plant, in fact, the largest in Eastern Oregon, from which electric power will be transmitted to the valley for distribution along the lines of railroad and to the different towns for lighting purposes.

Mr. Davidson expects to arrive here from Sumpter about August 16, after which time he will make his permanent home in this city. In speaking of the prospects ahead of the new company Mr. Davidson says, in a letter to the East Oregonian from Sumpter, that they expect the new line of electric road in Grande Ronde valley to revolutionize the beet culture and cord wood business there, besides stimulating fruit and small truck growing in the foothill districts.

At the present time all the cordwood is hauled for miles to the different towns, but the road will tap a timber belt at Union, and also at Elgin, giving the settlers access to market without making a long haul.

Sugar beets are not now raised in many localities there because of the long haul to the railroad. When this road encircles the valley, it will tap the beet belt, affording cheap transportation to the factory, and as the track will be built standard gauge, O. R. & N. cars will be hauled by it around the entire circuit of the valley, thus bringing the small farmers and truck gardeners in easy reach of the main line and markets. It is estimated that 1000 carloads of produce can be handled annually by the new road.

THE SPOKANE FAIR.

Many Exhibitors Now Inquiring for Information.

Superintendent L. G. Monroe of the Spokane fair, October 3 to 9, is receiving many inquiries from farmers and fruitgrowers who propose to exhibit at the fair and who will compete for the liberal prizes which are offered this year. The many questions which are asked show the interest which is being taken this year. These people ask for premium lists, particulars of exhibiting fruit and vegetables and instructions for picking and packing.

Taggard & Riggs of Walsburg, Wash., claim to have 35 acres of about as fine apples as were ever grown in the state. They expect to make exhibits of these apples, both in a general display and in the plate competitions. Mr. Taggard also says he has some fine pears which he believes are prize winners. He asks for instructions as to the best

manner of picking, packing and preserving this fruit. This is a sample of the inquiries made and the interest shown in this year's fair, and it is these letters which have convinced Mr. Monroe that the fruit and agricultural department will be better this year than at any time since the good old days when Herbert Bolster ran the fruit fairs and delighted everybody with the genial hospitality of Spokane, and the fine exhibits of the Inland Empire.

Knights of Fidelity Meeting.

Seymour, Ind., Aug. 9.—The grand lodge, Knights of Fidelity of Indiana, composed of retail liquor dealers, began its annual convention here today. Several hundred members are in attendance from various parts of the state. The convention, which will be in session two days, will consider measures looking to the further protection of those engaged in the saloon trade from the prohibitionists and other organized antagonists of the liquor interests.

PRINTERS' UNION

IS IN ANNUAL SESSION FOR THE FIFTIETH TIME.

Three Disastrous Strikes During the Past Year, But the Organization Has Made Progress During That Time, There Being Great Gains in Membership—Eight Hour Day and Arbitration the Leading Present Issues—Cash Balance on Hand of \$36,357.62.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 9.—The International Typographical union, whose fiftieth annual convention was formally opened yesterday in the convention hall at the World's fair, got down to business in earnest today. Officers' reports were presented and various questions of importance to the craft were introduced and referred to the proper committee for consideration and action.

The reports of the officers show that the last year with the organization has been one of fair progress, marked by three disastrous strikes, but at the same time by decided gains and successes. Of the latter President Lynch said in his annual report to the convention that "hours have been reduced, wrong eliminated and difficulty avoided through a careful observance of the law, patient negotiation and international assistance."

President Lynch urged the union to stand for the eight-hour day and suggested that the present convention take some decided action looking toward the establishment of the eight-hour day. The president also called attention to the arbitration agreement between the International Typographical Union and the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, entered into at a joint meeting of representatives in New York last October, and recommended that "if the agreement is to live its acknowledged shortcomings shall be remedied."

The report of the president also set forth that not so much attention has been paid in the last year to the organization of new unions as has been devoted to strengthening those in the field. In spite of that fact, the report showed that with one exception—the fiscal year of 1902-1903—the membership of the union has grown more rapidly than during the last 12 months than ever before in its history. The average paying membership during the year was 3729 more than it was in the preceding year. The union had at the end of the fiscal year, a cash balance on hand of \$36,357.62, as against a balance of \$49,170 for the preceding year.

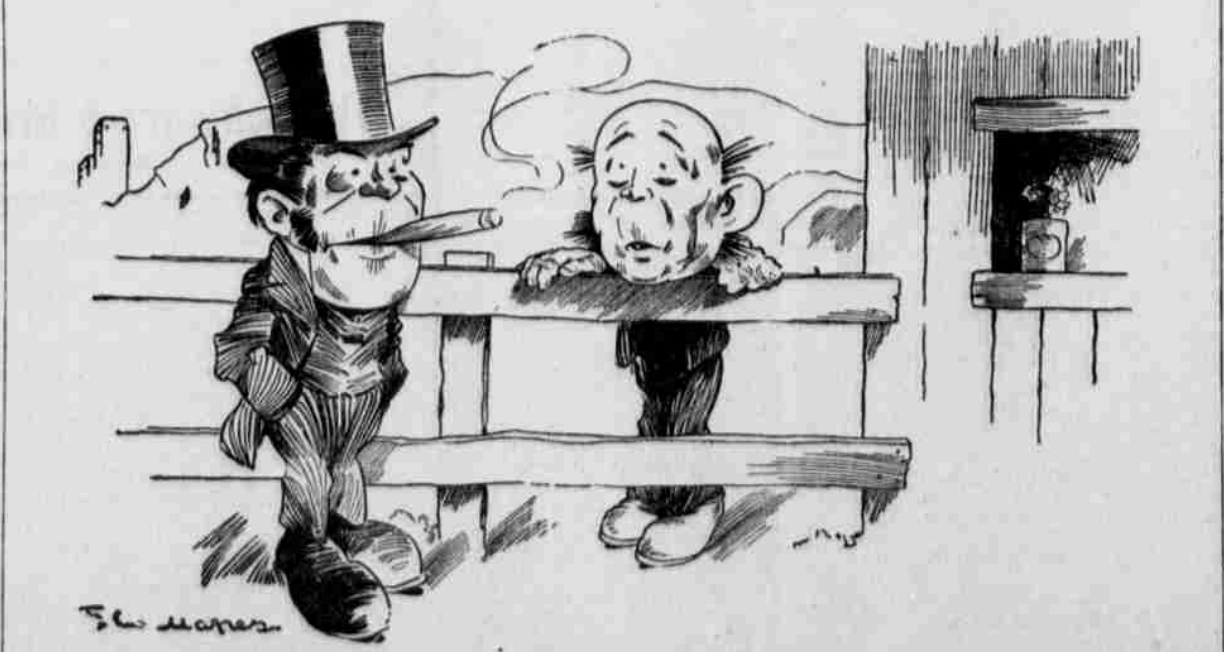
