PROTECT STREAMS

W. T. SHAW SAYS FORESTS
MUST BE PRESERVED.

Freewater District is Producing Heav-
iest Crop in Its History. With a
Low Stage of Water in the River—
Land That Was a Rockpile Six
Years Ago Now Worth \$100 Per
Acre—Six Tons of Alfalfa Per Acre
Per Year, With Only Winter Irri-
gation.

W. T. Shaw, the veteran irrigator
of Freewater, was in the city last
evening on business, and reports the
heaviest crops ever harvested in his
district.

"We have had plenty of water this
season, to make excellent crops," said
Mr. Shaw, "and if they will just allow
us to use the waste water, the sur-
plus, that which cannot be used by
anyone else, we can make that country
bloom every year."

The Walla Walla river had been
lower this year than usual, and yet
land owned by Shaw has produced
about six tons of alfalfa per acre.
He has over 100 acres, from which he
has harvested about 600 tons in a
dry year. This land was a barren
rock pile six years ago, and is today
worth \$100 per acre. And all the ir-
rigation it needs is a winter soak-
ing, and an occasional wetting in the
middle of the summer, if possible.

Mr. Shaw says if the water sources
in the mountains are not protected
from forest fires and heavy grazing,
the life of the irrigated lands is actu-
ally threatened. The forest reserve
and the protected areas must save the
water sources for the valley below.
The water of the rivers in this moun-
tain country depends on the snow
which is held on late in the spring
by the timber and vegetation, just
as the crops depend on the rivers.

He believes the most destructive
and ruinous policy ever practiced is
that of destroying, and reducing the
vegetation by heavy grazing, and by
cutting off the timber from the high
mountains which feed the rivers and
creeks, which in turn keep alive the
irrigated districts.

SALEM'S DISAPPOINTMENT.

Over \$14,000 Yet Needed to Complete
Her New Postoffice Building.

It is certain that the postoffice
grounds in this city will have to re-
main in their present unsightly and
disgraceful condition for at least an-
other year, for, despite the report
coming from Washington during the
last session of congress, to the con-
trary, it has been definitely learned
that there has been no appropriation
made for that purpose, and there are
no funds in the United States treas-
ury available to complete the work
that was left unfinished by reason of
the original appropriation having been
insufficient, says the Salem States-
man.

Having read the item in the news-
papers to the effect that congress had
appropriated about \$15,000 for the
improvement of the postoffice site
in this city, the estimated required
sum being \$14,000, Postmaster Hirsch
has written several letters to the
postoffice department and treasury
department at Washington, urging
that he be authorized to begin the
work of improvement before the win-
ter season arrived, but, to his sur-
prise he received a reply to the ef-
fect that no such appropriation had
been made.

COMBINED FLOUR OUTPUT.

Daily Capacity of Northwest Mills is
Now 63,885 Barrels.

The flour mills of the Pacific coast
according to a recent estimate, num-
ber 362, with a combined capacity of
63,885 barrels every 24 hours. To
make a barrel of flour requires four
and one-half bushels of wheat. The
mills of the Northwest when running
full capacity, might use 267,485 bush-
els of wheat every day.

The state of California, it is esti-
mated, can manufacture 21,785 bar-
rels of flour every 24 hours, for which

FUSION IN NEBRASKA.

Democrats and Populists Confronted
With Several Problems.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 10.—Keen in-
terest is manifested in the state con-
ventions of the democrats and populists
in session here today. With Mr.
Bryan in full control of the democrat-
ic convention it is not likely that the
St. Louis platform and candidates
will receive more than a perfunctory
indorsement. Considerable difficulty
is expected also in bringing about a
satisfactory basis for fusion with the
populists on the state ticket.

Still another interesting feature of
the convention is that relating to the
indorsement of a candidate for the
United States senate. The republic-
ans have made the challenge by for-
mally nominating in state convention
a candidate for the senatorship.
Whether the democrats will accept
the challenge by indorsing Mr. Bryan
for the senate is as yet undecided.

the coals, where it remains until Christ-
mas morning, which they salute by re-
peated firings of a pistol.

Christmas. Skewered to a long piece of
wood, the pig is turned over a blazing
fire until cooked, the guests watching
the process with increasing interest.
After dinner stories are told and songs
sung. Santa Claus, who, in the person

parts after the feast, decorated with a
long ring of cakes around his neck and
laden with such gifts as his friends can
