## NORTH M'KAY NOTES

FINE WHEAT YIELDS IN THE DRY DISTRICT

Sewage Contaminates River Water — Dog Threatened With Rabies — Roads Are Very Dusty—Irrigation Successfully Carried on by Wheels Fixed on River Bank—Threshing is in Progress Everywhere.

North McKay, Aug. 12.—If this thing keeps up people will be for making a summer resort of Sheol. But while old Sol is striking down his thousands in the East he leaves out those tricks in Oregon.

I hear that some stranger working for the Gillet-Fancher threshing outfit just north of the river was made violently sick and unable to labor a few days ago, caused by drinking water from the river. He was ignorant of its deadly character.

On Wednesday last a stranger drove a band of cattle and horses to the river here. He said they had been a day and a half without drink and their actions verified his words, for as soon as they caught sight of the river they started on the run for a drink, but on getting into the water a large part refused to drink at all, and those that did, very sparingly. The horses would not touch it after smelling of it.

William Fitzgerald, our civil war veteran friend below town, is erecting himself a fine cottage below Walters mill. 'Tis a home-made article designed and executed by himself, but it is nice just the same.

The roads, as usual at this time of the year, are ground to an impalpable powder with frequent chuck holes leading to Port Arthur.

John S. Wheeler and son, with eight or 10 horses, are engaged in threshing near Helix.

A dog belonging to John Paydon was dangerously near being afflicted with the rabies the other day. He frothed at the mouth, running lither and thither, snapping at everything.

Early summer and cooking apples are rather plentiful in the orchards in the valley and the windfalls can be had very cheap by picking them up.

All the wheat raisers—Yohnka, Marks, Fancher and others in the once abandoned region north of town, report a yield of 25 and 30 bushels of fine wheat, which puts them all on easy street. Last year they were living in dejection alley.

George Kidder, Barney Crowner and Mr. De Lateur, all having ranches below town, are successfully operating wheels in raising water for irrigation. The wheels are all large, 12x 14 feet, and where they are properly constructed and the water applied right, they are very successful.

In fifteen years I never knew so steady a draft of hot, fiercely scorching winds to come from the West. It is estimated that the forest fires prevailing in the Cascades and portions of Western Washington are responsible for it.

### Planting Trees for Paper.

The report comes from Oregon City that the Willamette Pulp & Paper Co. has set out 64,000 young cottonwood trees during the past year. This company is one of the largest consumers of timber in the state, manufacturing over 100 tons of white paper daily, to say nothing of the wood pulp shipped to California points. Cottonwood, white fir, hemlock and spruce are the varieties of timber used in the manufacture of paper. The cottonwood, which is a valuable wood for paper making, is gradually becoming a scarcity on account of the demands made on it for this purpose. It is of rapid growth, and for a number of years the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company has been making active efforts to replace the depleted groves.

## G. A. R. AT BOSTON

CITY IS FILLING UP WITH MANY THOUSANDS.

"The Hub" is Elaborately Decorated, and is Taking a Holiday—Electric Display is Beautiful—Hot Contest Ahead Over Successor to Commander in Chief Black—Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans Will Meet.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 13.—Boston today has capitulated to the advance guard of the Grand Army veterans, the forerunner of the tens of thousands who will be here during the coming week for the annual national encampment. These, with the ladies accompanying them and the immense throng of visitors attracted to the Hub by the encampment and low railroad rates, have swelled the city's population to such an extent as to cause one to wonder if all the inhabitants of Greater Boston have been forced inside the city's limits.

All day long delegations have been arriving from North, South, East and West. By hundreds and fifties they have come, in coach, parlor cars, sleeping and special until tonight there will be assembled here an army the like of which has seldom been seen before in Boston.

The entire city has donned a holiday dress and on every hand flags, banners, gaily colored streamers and flashing lights greet the eye. Immense numbers of incandescent lights have been arranged to represent known emblem of the Grand Army and its affiliated organizations. The illuminations, to be seen tonight for the first time promise to surpass anything of the kind ever attempted here before. The principal illuminations will be on Commonwealth avenue, where thousands of electric bulbs have been strung from tree to tree across the avenue wall. At various intervals electric badges of the Grand Army and the Relief Corps have been suspended across the walk forming archways for pedestrians.

The public gardens will be ablaze with electric lights and decorations. Over each entrance of the gardens are festoons and drapings of bunting. A continuous line of red, white and blue electric lights extends around the gardens, interspersed with appropriate designs. From Charles street as far as West street the historic Common is decorated and at night will be resplendent with thousands of lights.

All the halls and hotels that will be used during the week have been handsomely decorated. Mechanics hall, where the grand camp fire is to be held, has received thousands of yards of bunting and hundreds of flags, both on the interior and exterior. Oil paintings of famous veterans of the civil war adorn the walls and galleries of the hall. Faneuil hall, "the cradle of liberty," and Tremont Temple, where the convention of the Women's Relief corps will be held, have been tastefully decorated.

About the corner of the Vendome hotel, where encampment headquarters were opened today, much gossip was heard among the veterans already arriving concerning the contest for commander-in-chief to succeed Gen. John C. Black of Illinois. So far there are but two active candidates in the field, but the contest between them promises to be very spirited. They are Gen. W. W. Blackmar, commander of the department of Massachusetts, and Past Department Commander John C. Shotts of New York.
