KNIGHTS IN LINE

GREAT OUTPOURING OF MEMBERS AND VISITORS.

Procession Was Impressive in the Last Degree—Fifteen Thousand Members of the Uniform Rank and Five Hundred Mounted Officers in Parade—Twenty-Five Thousand of the Members of Subordinate Lodges Also Present.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 16.—This has been a gala day in the history of Louisville, and, though the city has been the scene of many large and imposing gatherings in the past few years, the spectacle witnessed today is conceded to have been one of the most impressive in the city's history, and to have brought within her confines the largest crowd ever seen on the streets.

The low rates on the railroads went into effect Saturday, and since Sunday the people have been coming in from all points in Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and other states. The railroads expected to carry 30,000 people or so, but the rush has been far beyond these figures.

The great crush came today, as the special attraction was the parade of the uniform rank and the subordinate lodges, which marched through the principal streets of the city. All public and private buildings were gaily decorated for the occasion, and everywhere along the line of march and on the principal streets the Knights of Pythias colors, enlivened with national flags, floated from windows and balconies or hung from ropes stretched across the streets.

When the hour for the parade arrived the people began to station themselves along the line of march, and on both sides of the street the masses of human beings filled the door yards, crowded the sidewalks and pushed far out into the street. For a distance of three miles the crowd was packed along the street and stood for two hours watching the pageant.

Supreme Chancellor Bangs and the officers of the supreme and grand lodges, the city and state and county officers viewed the parade from the reviewing stand. The column, consisting of fully 15,000 members of the uniform rank, started at 2 o'clock, the officers, numbering about 500, all being on richly caparisoned steeds. The Kentucky brigade of several regiments and bands, led the march. Indiana and Illinois came next with the largest number in line. Ohio, Iowa, Michigan, California, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and other states were well represented. More than a score of states in all were represented in the uniform rank, and as many were in the subordinate lodges, the members of the latter in the parade being about 25,000.

REFORM SCHOOL REPORT.

Average for the Past Two Years Has Been About 120 Inmates.

Salem, Aug. 16.—The semi-annual report of the Oregon State Reform school was yesterday submitted to the state board. It is, in part, as follows:

"In compliance with the demand for, and the necessity of a reform school for boys, the state legislature passed a law at the session of 1889 establishing this school.

"It was opened for the reception of boys November 5, 1891, and up to the present time has been under the supervision of the following superintendents: B. J. Miles, now superintendent of the Washington, D. C., reform school; M. W. Smith, R. J. Hendricks, E. M. Croisan, H. E. Bickers and N. H. Looney.

THINNING RANKS

FEWER OLD SOLDIERS THAN EVER BEFORE.

Line of March Shortened to Accommodate the Weakened Veterans—Parade Strictly Military, no Women or Children or Other Diversions Being Allowed—Increasing Number of Disabled Who Must Ride in Carriages—March Lasted But Four Hours.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 16.—There were not so many of the boys in blue in line as in former years, but notwithstanding this fact the parade today of the veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic in this city will be long remembered by the thousands of people who packed the streets along the line of march to witness it.

The parade started at 10 a. m., being concluded at 2 p. m., the line of march being but little over two miles long. The route, all over smooth asphalt streets, was from Commonwealth avenue to Arlington street, to Beacon street, to School street, to Washington street, to Milk street, to Devonshire street, to Summer street, to Washington street, to Temple place, to Tremont street, to Boylston street, to Park square.

From every porch, window and roof of every building along the line of march people looked down on the long line of bobbing blue and to these spectators the veterans sent back cheers and hand waves of greeting. The human flag that the G. A. R. committee had planned so carefully was all that could be hoped for. The stand especially constructed for it was on the Common facing Temple place, through which the parade passed on its way to Park square. The reviewing stand for Commander in Chief Black and distinguished guests was on the Boylston street mall. The parade passed both the state house and city hall, giving both state and municipal officials an opportunity to review it.

With military precision the veterans of Antietam, Gettysburg, Vicksburg and Appomattox swung into line at the appointed hour, ready for the command to march. A platoon of police led the column. Following the bands, drum corps and Commander in Chief Black and his escort, came the several departments of the Grand Army, with the Department of Illinois in the van. Naturally Massachusetts turned out the largest representation. Second in point of number was New York, followed by Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, and Missouri. Throughout the parade was strictly military, no women, children or grotesque costumes being permitted. The few carriages in line were reserved for the use of disabled veterans who came in for round after round of hearty cheers all along the route.

This afternoon exercises were held in Festival hall, the speakers including President Francis of the exposition, and John E. Gunckel, president of the Toledo Newsboys' Association.
