ROADS IN WALLOWA

ELECTRIC LINE IS NOW HEADED THAT WAY.

W. E. Davidson of This City, Speaks of the Great Need of Transportation in That District—Oregon Development Company Surveying a Line From Elgin Toward Lewiston to Connect Hill and Harriman Lines—Great Power Possibilities.

Surveyors are at work establishing the route and grade for the proposed electric railway to connect the Wallowa country with Elgin and the Grande Ronde valley, and which it is thought will ultimately be extended to Lewiston and thus establish a railroad between the Hill and Harriman lines.

W. E. Davidson, of W. E. Davidson & Company, Pendleton mining brokers, who is secretary of the Eastern Oregon Development Company, says it is the intention of his company to have an electric line into the Wallowa as soon as possible.

"We have ample power in sight," he said, "to furnish unlimited electricity to that part of the country. We will establish a large generating station on the Minam river, capable of furnishing 25,000 horse power.

"Modern transportation facilities are badly needed in the Wallowa country. The territory is rich in agricultural possibilities as well as mineral and stock, but an outlet is needed. Many of the heavy land owners have signified their intention of cutting up their vast tracts to induce settlement in case the road is built."

Mr. Davidson believes that within the next five years all available water rights in the state of Oregon will be secured by electrical development companies. "There has been wonderful advancement along this line during the past 18 months," he continued, "and it will be but a few years until the West is just such a network of electrical roads as is the East.

"In time our company may extend its lines into Pendleton, but at the present time the resources between this city and La Grande are not sufficient to warrant such a course.

"The Eastern Oregon Development Company is in hopes of securing control of the steam road between Union station and Union for the purpose of converting it into an electric line. It is three miles from the O. R. & N. and the present connection between the main line and the town is a stern road, owned by a private concern. The road is very unsatisfactory."

Mr. Davidson is a recent arrival in Pendleton and he is greatly impressed with the progressiveness of this city. "Baker City is very dull," he said. "I have seen more people in Pendleton's streets in one day than I saw in Baker City in two weeks. I have seen the time during the day when one could have fired a gun down Baker's principal street without endangering anyone's life."

COLORED GOODS BARRED.

Food Commissioner Issues Order Against Red Catsups.

Within two months, if the rule made by the national convention of the state dairy and pure food association is followed out, colored catsups will be a thing of the past on Oregon markets, says the Telegram.

All the wholesale houses of Portland have agreed to observe the rule and will not sell colored catsups in this state after they have disposed of the stock on hand. It is expected that this will take two months.

The rule which forbids the sale of the present quality of catsups in the Oregon market was made about a month ago by J. W. Bailey, food and dairy commissioner of Oregon. All the wholesale houses assented immediately, having as an example the actions of wholesale and retail houses in 24 states.

LOCKOUT DELAYS SCHOOLS.

Over 20,000 School Children Will Be Affected by the Big Strike.

New York, Aug. 19.—The most aggravating features of the lockout are delays in the completion of the subway and the prevention of the erection of much needed school houses. It is estimated that over 20,000 school children will be deprived of their privilege to attend school next fall owing to the lack of school buildings.

Over \$5,000,000 are available for the erection of new school houses, but owing to the lockout nothing can be done, unless some arrangement is made to exempt school buildings from the operations of the lockout.

Acting Mayor Charles V. Fornes is very anxious to bring about some compromise between the allied building trades and the employers that will make it possible to push the erection of the much needed school houses.

Dr. Davidson Coming.

London, Aug. 19.—Dr. Davidson, the Archbishop of Canterbury, is among the passengers on the Celtic sailing for New York today. The primary object of Dr. Davidson's trip to the United States is to attend the Episcopal General Convention, to be held at Boston next October. The interval between his arrival and the opening of the convention will be spent by Dr. Davidson in visiting friends in Canada and in New York.

Auto Meet at Cleveland.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 19.—The automobile race meet for which arrangements have been making for some time, opened successfully today at the Glenville track. The day's events included a 100-yard obstacle race, a two-mile race for runabouts, a five-mile race for stock cars, a two-mile race for electric, a five-mile open handicap, a two-mile open moto cycle race and a five-mile open race for stripped stock cars.

Western Bible Study Conference.

Lake Geneva, Wis., Aug. 19.—The fourteenth Western Bible Study Conference under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Association opened here today and will continue for 10 days. Among the prominent speakers taking part are the Rev. Frank Bagley, of Denver, the Rev. Austin K. De Blois, of Chicago, the Rev. John McDowell of Detroit, and S. D. Gordon, of Cleveland.

Plans for Sir Henry Irving.

London, Aug. 19.—Sir Henry Irving is anxious that it should be known that there is no foundation whatever for the report that he intends to visit South Africa. He will play only in Great Britain, Ireland and the United States prior to his retirement two years hence.

Thread Mills Shut Down.

Pawtucket, R. I., Aug. 18.—The mills of the J. & P. Coats Thread Company, Limited, which have been running on short time for two months, shut down today to remain closed until September 1. The shut-down leaves nearly 2500 unemployed.

NEWS OF MILTON

VERY LITTLE WATER IN THE WALLA WALLA RIVER.

William Nichols Has Built a Residence—Milton District Will Vote on Proposition to Establish the Higher Grades in the City Schools—Discussion Involves Question of Allegiance to Columbia College.

Milton, Aug. 18.—The water is lower in the Walla Walla river now than it has been for years. There is scarcely enough to keep the surface moist.

One hundred and thirteen tickets were sold at this place Wednesday for Walla Walla.

Th Frazier threshing outfit has finished harvesting and stored away their machine until next year.

William Nichols has erected a neat six-room cottage in the south end of town, for rent.

A petition, signed by 92 of the 240 voters of the Milton school district, for the purpose of getting an expression of the patrons of the school in regard to getting the higher grades in the public school, has been handed to the directors, who have called a meeting to be held September 5.

About two years ago the same question was brought up and voted down, on account of the starting of Columbia college, which the majority of the citizens were anxious to see prosper.

Now, as the college has a firm foundation and the district is fully able to support the ninth and tenth grades in the public school, those having children who have completed the public school course do not feel able to pay \$30 tuition, are asking the citizens to help establish the higher grades in the public school.

There are several parties here who have promised the college their support, which is all right, and others would gladly do so if they were able to, but they are not.

The question is being discussed pretty thoroughly, and if another hot wave comes over Milton on September 5, just blame the citizens for it.
