ADMIRAL RETIRES

OFFICIAL CLOSE OF
ADMIRABLE RECORD.

Graduate of Annapolis, and Had Seen
Much and Unusual Service, Begin-
ning With the Civil War—Closed
His Record by a Detail to Foreign
Countries—First Service Was Dur-
ing the Civil War.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 24.—With
the retirement today of Rear Admiral
John C. Watson the navy loses one of
its ablest and most honorable and
useful officers. His career, from the
date of his graduation from the naval
academy in 1860, has been full of
honors and credit, and few officers of
the navy have seen more active service.

Admiral Watson belongs to a family
that has distinguished itself in peace
and war since the early days of the
American republic. He was born in
Frankfort, Ky., August 21, 1842. His
father, Edward Howe Watson, was a
skilled physician of the old school,
and his mother, Sarah Lee Crittenden
Watson, was a daughter of John Jordan
Crittenden, the famous Kentucky
statesman, rival of Henry Clay, gov-
ernor at one time of Kentucky and at-
torney general in William Henry Har-
rison's cabinet.

Admiral Watson entered the naval
academy in 1856 and graduated four
years later, standing high in his
class. He was immediately assigned to
the rank of midshipman, and August
15, 1860, joined the Suesquehanna
in that capacity for a cruise to Eu-
rope. While he was abroad the Civil
war broke out and he returned at
once to take part in it.

He was commissioned a lieutenant
in 1862, and in January, 1864, he was
made flag lieutenant to Farragut. He
was at the battles of New Orleans,
Mobile Bay, Vicksburg and Port Hud-
son. In a letter to his son, Loyal, during
the war, Admiral Farragut tells
him of young Watson's volunteering
to slip off and blow up a blockade
runner. Among other things he says:

"It was an anxious night for me, as
I am about as fond of Watson as I am
of your own dear self."

It was Admiral Watson, then a
young lieutenant, who lashed Farragut
to the rigging during the battle of
Mobile Bay. The powerful Confed-
erate iron-clad Tennessee attacked
the Hartford fleet. Farragut took
up his position in the port mizen rig-
ging, the better to observe the fight,
and to direct and cheer his men. Lieut-
enant Watson, seeing the great dan-
ger to which the intrepid admiral was
exposing himself, procured a rope and
lashed him in his place.

The relations which existed be-
tween Admiral Farragut and his flag
lieutenant were of the most affec-
tionate description. In his official re-
port of the Mobile battle, Farragut
showed what he thought of young
Watson.

"Lieutenant Watson," he wrote,
"has been brought to your attention
in former times. He was on the poop,
attending to the signals and perform-
ing his duty as might be expected,
thoroughly."

During the war with Spain it was
Admiral Watson, then a commodore,
who was ordered to sea with a squad-
ron to destroy Admiral Camara's fleet
which was believed to be preparing
to return to Spain from the Suez can-
al. During the later period of the
war he distinguished himself with
the squadron in West Indian waters.
Lately Admiral Watson had been on
special duty abroad to report what is
being done for the betterment of the
enlisted personnel of foreign navies.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR EN ROUTE.

Three Hundred Delegates From Penn-
sylvania.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 24.—The Penn-
sylvania movement to the triennial
conclave of the Knights Templar of
the United States begins this evening,
when a special train leaves this city
bearing the members of the Pittsburg
Commandery, No. 1, and their friends.
The train will be made up of six of
the most modern Pullman sleepers, in
addition to a baggage car and a com-
missary car. There will be about 300
persons in the party.

The trip to San Francisco is to be
made by way of St. Paul, and includes
stops at Fargo, Helena and other
points in addition to a visit of several
days in the Yellowstone park. Leav-
ing Montana the party will proceed to
Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, and over
the Shasta route to Monterey, Santa
Cruz and other points, arriving in San
Francisco on September 3. The re-
turn will be through Southern Califor-
nia, the party visiting the Grand
Canyon and the petrified forests of
Arizona en route.
