## FEED CONDITIONS

PRICES OF HAY SAME AS LAST YEAR.

Alfalfa Yields About Equal to That of 1903—Prices of Loose Hay \$9 and \$10 Per Ton—First Cutting of Alfalfa Considered Best for Fat—Barley Hay is Not a Favorite—Chopped Feed \$22 Per Ton.

Growers and buyers both report that the alfalfa crop, while it is excellent, is not better than it was last year. In fact, the yield is about the same, as far as can be ascertained, but as the acreage is increasing continually, the natural result is that there is more alfalfa raised.

Nearly all the alfalfa hay that is marketed in Pendleton comes from the Hudson Bay and Echo districts—localities widely separated, but peculiarly adapted to the culture of alfalfa. Most of the Butter Creek alfalfa is either fed out in that neighborhood to cattle and sheep, or is shipped in other directions. As a matter of fact, there is very little surplus for shipment, and the development of the stock industry in that country makes it quite improbable that any will be raised over there for export for a long time.

Some of last year's crop of alfalfa can be found now in stock in local feed dealers' lots. This hay is choice.

### First Cutting the Best.

It is not generally known that the first cutting is regarded by experienced stockmen—liverymen and beef feeders alike—as the most fattening. Beginning with the second cutting the alfalfa deteriorates so far as fattening qualities are concerned.

No baled alfalfa is yet in the market of this year's crop. Loose hay costs the consumer \$9 to \$10 per ton.

All the grain hay this year is fine in quality, while the yield is about the same as last year. It was believed that it would be larger, but the average farmer seemed to be possessed of the notion that grain would be more profitable, while the results of the harvest in some localities within easy hauling distance of Pendleton have proven differently. Already several farmers who raised grain near town have decided that next year they will largely increase their hay acreage, the expense of raising hay being so much lighter, and the profits being proportionately greater. Loose wheat hay costs the consumer here from \$8 to \$9 per ton.

### Ban on Barley Hay.

Barley hay is discounted from the start by the set and increasing prejudice against it as a feed for horses. It is acknowledged to be wholesome, and horses are fond of it, but it is ruinous to their mouths. The beads

cling to the inside of the lip and outside of the gums, producing irritation and inflammation, until in many cases the animal is unable to eat anything else until its mouth is healed. On the other hand, cattle are not subject to this trouble, or at least in any degree that is at all annoying.

### Chopped Feed Prices.

Chopped barley feed is worth now \$22 per ton, or \$11.12½ per 100 pounds straight. These are the same prices that prevailed last year at this time. Bran costs 60 cents for 65 pounds.

The above prices both for hay and chopped feeds are those prevailing now, and are subject to immediate fluctuations.

### Footlights for Fitz.

New York, Aug. 27.—Bob Fitzsimmons has forsaken the roped arena for the stage. Tonight, at the Metropolitan theater, the former heavyweight will make his debut in an immense melodrama called "A Fight for Love." This will not be the first appearance of Fitz behind the footlights, but it will mark his debut as a real live actor of the melodramatic school. His neighbors at Bensonhurst say that he has been rehearsing faithfully during the hot summer and they predict a glorious success for him as a thespian.

### Irish League Convention.

New York, Aug. 27.—All arrangements have been completed for the second national convention of the United Irish League of America, which is to be held in this city during the coming week. The prime object of the league is to obtain home rule for Ireland. It was organized in Boston two years ago and has branches all over the United States and Canada. The convention will be attended by a delegation representing the Irish parliamentary party and headed by John E. Redmond. A public reception in honor of the members of the delegation will be given in Carnegie hall tomorrow.
