GENERAL NEWS.

The New York, New Haven & Hartford railway will expend \$8,000,000 in rapid transit equipment during the next year.

In an explosion of a kerosene tank in a New York tenement house Sunday night, Mrs. Israel Rosenzweig and baby were burned to death.

At the reception to John W. Redmond, the Irish patriot, at New York City, Sunday night, \$10,000 was subscribed for the Irish cause.

Gold mines estimated to be worth \$500,000,000 have just been discovered in the province of Iwate, Japan. They will be immediately opened on a large scale.

Howard Chenovitch, a drunken cowboy, killed Constable Rodriguez and City Marshal Kilburn, of Silver City, N. M., Monday and fatally wounded Pat Nunn, in a saloon fight.

Rev. T. S. Leonard, pastor of the Methodist church at Victor, Col., is in jail charged with interfering with the official duties of Sheriff Bell. It is the outcome of the Victor riots.

Four women wives of prominent business men of Cuba, Kan., raided saloons of that city with hatchets, Sunday, breaking bar fixtures and despoiling dozens of cases of booze.

George E. Tomlinson is the only one out of about 20 contestants in the World's Fair balloon ascension, at St. Louis, to successfully navigate the air. He was last seen 200 miles east of St. Louis, going 20 miles per hour.

Because he objected to them keeping company, Lorenz Leutsch shot his step-daughter and her lover in Chicago, Sunday night and then killed himself. The girl will die, but her lover will recover.

Nunzio Marino, who shot and killed Giuseppe Marmanno and fatally wounded Mrs. Marmanno at Newark, N. J., Monday in eluding a crowd of pursuers, dashed into a salt marsh, underlaid with quicksands and sank into the sands and perished before he could be captured.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The new fish hatchery at New Westminster, B. C., will have a capacity of 50,000,000 fry and will be the largest on the Pacific coast.

Rev. J. L. Hershner, for 10 years pastor of the Congregational church at Hood River, has resigned because his flock objected to the liberality of his views.

Jane Nelson, of Eugene, was arrested Monday for larceny committed over a year ago at that place. He thought it was forgotten and returned to town.

For the first time in 50 years all the saloons of Baker City were closed tight last Sunday. Many of the old pioneers laid in a supply on Saturday night for just such an emergency.

Fire by spontaneous combustion caused \$30,000 worth of damage in the Davidson Fruit Company's cannery at Hood River, Monday. An explosion of canned fruit started the fire.

In a drunken fight at Newport Sunday afternoon, City Marshal Beach shot and perhaps fatally wounded Al Reid, who had stabbed a gambler, John Chiswell, and was resisting arrest.

The Crescent, the largest vessel of the class to enter the Columbia river, is in the harbor at Portland. She is a five-masted schooner, and carries 1334 tons net. She will load 2,000,000 feet of lumber for the Orient.

RATES ARE REDUCED

RAILROADS FAVOR WESTERN LIVESTOCK MEN.

Passenger Association Makes Cheap Rate From Pacific Coast Points to Denver Meeting of Livestock Association in January—Secretary Martin Says the Best Rate Ever Offered Has Just Been Made.

Denver, Col., Aug. 30.—In response to the request of the National Livestock Association and the National Woolgrowers' Association for a rate of one fare for the round trip on the occasion of their annual meetings which will be held in this city Jan. 9-13 inclusive, the secretary of the National Livestock Association is this morning in receipt of a letter from Chairman James Charlton of the Trans-Continental Passenger Association which says:

"This association will make a rate from Pacific coast territory, to use one 30-day first-class fare for the round trip, via direct routes, usual diverse routes to apply.

"For tickets from San Francisco, Tracy, Lathrop, Stockton, Redding and points intermediate, going direct to Denver, returning via Portland, rate to be \$13.50 higher than direct line rates.

"For tickets from points south of San Francisco, Tracy, Lathrop and Stockton, going direct, returning via Portland, the usual arbitrary is to be added.

"For tickets from North Pacific points, going direct, return via San Francisco, rates to be \$13.50 higher than direct line rates.

"The foregoing amounts added for circuit covering Portland and San Francisco, to accrue to lines south of Portland.

"Limits: Tickets to be limited to continuous passage going commencing date of sale with final return limit 30 days and permit stop-over returning within final limit.

"Dates of sale to be determined by Pacific Coast terminal lines."

The secretary of the National Livestock Association this morning states that this rate was the most satisfactory that has ever been granted by the Trans-continental Passenger Association and the promptness in which it was made is exceedingly encouraging to the officers of the association, as it will no doubt insure a very large attendance from the West and Northwest territory.

M. E. CONFERENCE TOMORROW.

Inland Empire to Have a New Methodist College Soon.

The twenty-first annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church will be held at The Dalles, beginning tomorrow morning, August 31. Bishop Henry Snelmeyer of Jersey City, N. J., one of the newly elected bishops, will preside. This conference includes all ministers of this church in Eastern Washington, the panhandle of Idaho, and the northern part of Eastern Oregon, numbering about 100.

To Found College.

One of the questions to be considered at this conference is the advisability of establishing a Methodist college in the Inland Empire, and much pressure will be brought to bear to have Spokane selected as the site.

The conference is divided into four districts, superintended in the absence of the bishops by the presiding elders who are appointed by the bishop and represent him during the interim of conferences.

The districts and presiding elders are: Spokane, Rev. Dr. H. Brown; Republic, Rev. Dr. O. W. Mintzer; Walla Walla, Rev. C. E. Gibson; The Dalles, Rev. Dr. G. M. Booth.
