Baker County Paper Waxes Reminiscent.

Senator Walter M. Pierce, farmer, politician, capitalist, and the same genial, whole-souled good fellow that he was 20, and even 19 years ago when he was working for Sam Booth in Grande Ronde valley for \$1.50 per day and board, alighted in Haines from Wednesday's east bound, and was soon thereafter on his way to the mountain ranch of Ellert Ellertson, in the locality where water power developments in which he is interested, are contemplated, says the Haines Record.

The senator informed a representative of the Record that his personal interests were in a good, healthy state of preservation, with the exception of his Grande Ronde valley wheat crop, which is, this year, decidedly below par.

This fact, however, will not deter him from his projected improvements upon his favorite property—the Hot Lake Sanitarium hotel, upon which he expects to expend \$75,000 or \$80,000 in the near future.

The brick will be shipped in during the fall and the work of construction will commence as soon as practical in the spring. Mr. Pierce says that this is the dull season at the lake and there are 70 guests there at the present time.
