# WILL STOP DAIRYING

## UKIAH BUTTER MAKER GOING OUT OF BUSINESS.

Announced That Charles McReynolds, One of the Most Prominent Dairy-men in Umatilla County, Will Retire From the Business on Account of Long Distance to Markets—McReynolds' Butter Well Known in Pendleton Markets.

It is announced that Charles McReynolds, the Ukiah butter maker, intends to go out of the business as soon as he can dispose profitably of his butter making plant.

Mr. McReynolds has made butter on his place several miles beyond Ukiah for from eight to 10 years, but on account of the distance from Pendleton, his best market, he finds the margin of profit decreasing to the vanishing point since competition has been established by nearer points.

This effect is not surprising—in fact, it was inevitable, as Mr. McReynolds' place is 52 miles from here. Of late, he had had an increasing market in the Sumpter district, but still the handicap of distance from the railroad, and difficulties of communication are too great to be overcome and leave sufficient margin to continue in the business in competition with butter makers nearer the railroad.

The excellence of the McReynolds butter is a proverb, and is largely due, outside of the great skill always used in its manufacture, to the fact that his range is entirely destitute of all noxious weeds, such as grow in more or less profusion at lower altitudes nearer the river. This is a condition greatly in his favor in the spring.

For years the daily output of Mr. McReynolds' plant has been about 40 rolls.

The suspension of the butter making plants in the Ukiah district, will induce the creamery concerns looking over the Pendleton field to establish a large creamery here.

### NELSON GETS CONTRACT.

#### Weston Brickyard Furnishes Brick for Odd Fellows' Building at The Dalles.

The Weston brickyard was today awarded the contract of supplying the pressed and red brick to be used in the construction of the Odd Fellows' temple at The Dalles. The contract calls for 300,000 bricks to be delivered this fall. Work on the structure has commenced.

It is to be two stories in height and will be one of the largest buildings in The Dalles. Umatilla county appears to have been a successful bidder; Clark of this city, was recently successful in securing the contract to furnish the hardware to be used.

The Weston yards are fast gaining a wide reputation in the Northwest. The making of pressed brick was begun this spring more as a matter of experiment, but Manager C. T. Nelson has had little trouble in disposing of all he turned out.

### BACK FROM COAST.

#### C. S. Wheeler Enthusiastic Over the "Medicine of the Sea."

C. S. Wheeler and wife greatly enjoyed their five weeks' stay at Long Beach, and declare there is but scant profit in staying at a seaside resort for any shorter time.

As Mr. Wheeler says, "It takes that long to get the malaria and 'that tired feeling' soaked out of the system." People from the sagebrush and irrigated districts are not habituated to more than a tubful of water at a time, and many of them get into the vandy deep up to their knees and then begin to sputter and drown and get chilled and back out and complain about the extreme cold.

Mr. Wheeler says the better way is to get in all over at once and let the very abundance of water warm one. This is a hard trick for the people from the interior to learn, but it is the only way to enjoy sea bathing.

Mr. Hall has been in the employ of the county for the past two years. He was appointed chief deputy clerk under W. D. Chamberlain and has been one of the most efficient employes ever in the county's service.

### EQUALIZING ASSESSMENT.

#### O. R. & N. Company Requests That Its Assessment Come Before County Court.

Tax Agent J. W. Morrow, of the O. R. & N. company, filed a request with the board of equalization today asking that the assessment of the road be reduced from \$12,000 a mile to \$5,500. His request that the matter not be given a hearing until the meeting of the county court next week, was granted.

Mrs. Susan Welch asked the board to reconsider the assessment of her property. Several lots belonging to Mrs. Welch are valued by the assessor at \$2185. The matter was taken under advisement.

"I do not expect many grievances to be filed," said Assessor C. P. Strain, this morning. "The taxpayers generally appear to be pretty well satisfied. Their objections were threshed out last year."

Connell of Umatilla, while coming down on No. 7 last evening from Walla Walla, had his right thumb badly crushed by the slamming of a car door upon it while the train was at or near Milton. The member was mutilated until amputation may be necessary, though Dr. Cole, who dressed the wound, thinks it may be saved. Mr. Connell suffered greatly for some time. He returned to Walla Walla this morning to put the thumb under the care of the company surgeon at that place.

### Registration Books to Open.

The poll books of the county for the registration of voters for the coming presidential election open September 15 and close on October 15. Persons to be eligible to vote must be male citizens of the United States over 21 years of age and lived at least six months in the state, three months in the county and 30 days in the precinct.

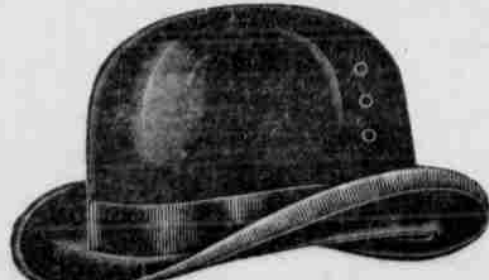
