

Quick Fortunes in the North

Terry Brennan, one of the best known characters in Alaska, and one of the first of the frontiersmen of the West to go to the Klondike, is visiting in Denver while on his way back from his old home in New York state, which he had not seen since he was a boy, 32 years ago, says the Denver Post.

Seven years ago, at the beginning of the great gold excitement and consequent rush to the Klondike country, Brennan was living in Butte, Mont., where he was known as "sport" and as an early frontiersman. He had a reputation as a prizefighter and as a promoter of that sport, while his brother was known over the world as the world's champion for 200 yards.

When he heard of the great riches and of the great excitement to be found in the new gold camps in the far North, the desire to keep to the van of civilization, which had prompted him to come West when he was but a boy, called Brennan to the Klondike. Arriving there he found that the wealth of the country had not been overestimated, but that the hardships to be endured were greater than he had ever dreamed of.

Pays Better Than Mining.

After trying mining and staking out several claims for himself in the neighborhood of Dawson, Brennan came back to Juneau and founded the business which has made him one of the wealthiest men in that land of gold.

Nothing paid better, or does still pay better, in Alaska than the tavern and dance hall business, and, of course, that included several other sources of revenue on the side. He founded and still owns the most popular theater in Alaska, the Peerless, and his place has become the meeting point for miners and river men on the Yukon returning with their bags of gold dust and nuggets in all the gold district of Alaska.

It is said that enough gold bullion has passed over Brennan's bar and into his coffers to pay a king's ransom. A good deal of it has gone into other hands, but enough remains to make Brennan one of the richest of the Klondikers.

Brennan is enthusiastic over the prospects for the future of Alaska, and believes that it is destined to become the great mining center for the world. The early mining was almost entirely placer work and searching for dust and nuggets, and although this has greatly diminished, the quartz mining has more than taken its place.

On Douglas island, situated across the bay from Juneau, is located the great stamp mill of the Treatwell mine, the largest stamp mill in the world, running 1200 stamps constantly, night and day, the only holidays ever being recognized being Christmas and the Fourth of July. Three shifts of eight hours each are used in working around and in the mill. The ore is of rather low grade, running about \$3.50 a ton, although the small cost of reduction brings the actual profit up considerably, the cost of reduction being only \$1.25 a ton. There are many mines in the neighborhood of Juneau, some of the richest being within three or four miles of the city.

Dawson Losing Supremacy.

Dawson still remains the center of the mining industry, but it is rapidly losing its supremacy. Juneau is a city of about 8000 people, and is now governed under its own municipal laws, a system which greatly lessens the power of the United States judges, the supreme controlling power in the territory, in the city itself.

It is only within the last year that the larger cities of Alaska have been allowed even this much self-government, and they are already showing the benefits derived from the change. It took several years of hard work on the part of James McCluskey and other wealthy mineowners of Juneau to obtain the charter for the city. The local self-government was opposed principally by the missionaries, who knew that if the matter were put to vote, that liquor would be admitted to the territory. Up to the time that the cities were allowed to govern themselves no liquor could legally be brought into the territory. Needless to say, this law was not respected, and hence it was determined to allow it to be sold, charging an extremely high license for the privilege.

RIFLEMEN AT SEA GIRL.

Ten-Days' Tournament of National Association.

Sea Girl, N. J., Sept. 1.—Rifle teams from several states are here for the annual meeting and competitions of the National Rifle Association. The meeting opens this afternoon with the inspectors' match, which will be followed by the Seabury and Spencer matches.

The tournament program covers 10 days and includes the Columbia trophy match at 200 and 500 yards, a carbine team match, the Wimbledon Cup match, company and regimental team matches, the Dryden trophy match and individual bull's eye shooting.

On Monday next the feature of the day's program will be the cadet match between Annapolis and West Point. The various contestants have made splendid scores in their practice work and before the tournament is ended it is expected some new scores will be established.

State Days at the World's Fair.

St. Louis, Sept. 1.—Indiana and Tennessee divided the honors at the exposition today. Governor Frazier and staff, together with many visitors, took part in the celebration of Tennessee Day and Governor Durbin and another large party of visitors from the Hoosier state helped to make the celebration of Indiana Day a distinct success. Parades were features of both celebrations, the Tennessee visitors marching from the Administration building to the Hermitage, and an hour later Governor Durbin and the delegation from Indiana paraded from the same starting point to the Indiana building.

in Commemoration of Massacre.

Monroe, Mich., Sept. 1.—With impressive ceremony and in the presence of a large crowd a handsome monument was unveiled here today in commemoration of the battle and massacre of the Raisin river, which occurred January 22 and 23, 1813. The unveiling was preceded by a parade of military and civic organizations. The oration of the day was delivered by United States Senator J. C. Burrows.

Poolrooms Must Close.

New Orleans, Sept. 1.—The death knell of poolrooms doing business in New Orleans and elsewhere in Louisiana was sounded today when the Hunnicke and poolroom law became operative. The new law attaches a penalty to running a poolroom or being employed in one amounting to a fine of not less than \$200 or not more than \$500 with imprisonment for six months.

WOMEN GAMBLERS

FORTY CAUGHT IN NEW YORK POLICE RAID.

Tip From Wronged Husband Led to the Discovery of Gambling Rooms Guarded by Two Women Lookouts—All Were Highly Respectable—Most of Them Wore Diamonds—Two Male Companions Under Arrest.

New York, Sept. 1.—Captain Hayes of the West Thirty-seventh street police station, received an anonymous letter yesterday morning from a man who said his wife was squandering all the money he gave her and more too in a pool room and gambling house patronized exclusively by women.

With several detectives he went in the afternoon to a four-story brown stone house in West Thirty-ninth street, the place complained of. An attack was made from front and rear. Barricaded doors were forced.

In the rear hallway the captain was met by two women lookouts. They threw their arms around his neck and hugged him real tight. Finally when the captain threatened, they released him and he climbed through the rear window into the back parlor.

There were 40 women in the place and two men. The men were greatly excited, the women were cool as cucumbers.

"Ladies," said the captain, "you need not be alarmed. We are only going to hold the principals."

"We are not alarmed," said the 40 in chorus. Many of them were rather good looking. Most of them wore diamonds.

The captain noticed that the women did not care to move about. He investigated and found that most of them were standing over piles of chips and bits of racing cards. One woman was holding a small roulette wheel.

"This is a manicure set," she told the captain. He took it with him to the station. He also carried away a large quantity of chips, racing cards, a telephone which had been concealed in a trunk, a red and black outfit and two roulette wheels. The two men were made prisoners. The women were told to go and never gamble again. None of them promised.

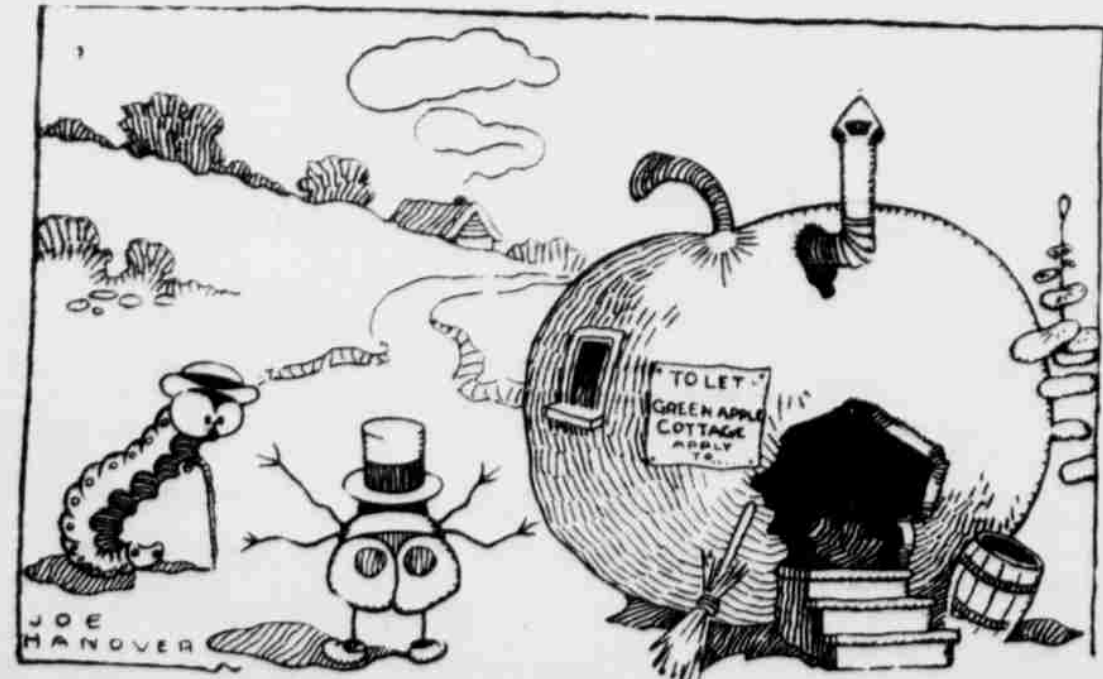
