GENERAL NEWS.

M. Kirmloff, an Associated Press correspondent, was shot through the lungs while on the firing line south of Liao Yang.

An excursion boat returning from Athens, Greece, from a trip along the coast, was caught in a gale, overturned and 25 persons drowned.

Over 100 cases of typhoid fever have developed within the past week in The Bronx, a suburb of New York, and great concern is felt.

There is little or no question but that the British expedition into Tibet will result in the Tibetan government acquiescing in all demands made by the British.

Administrators of the estate of the late Mrs. J. H. McVickers, of Chicago, claim that \$29,000 in cash belonging to the estate and known to be in existence last April, has disappeared.

W. W. Weighman, manufacturing chemist of Philadelphia, is dead. He left his entire fortune of \$50,000,000 to his widowed daughter, Mrs. Anna M. Walker, who is now one of the richest women in the world.

William Mahoney, aged 3 years, fell from a seventh story window in New York and struck a canvas awning four stories below. He was unhurt, and was taken inside the building through a window, laughing.

A portion of a main street in Knoxville, Tenn., is caving in, and surrounding lots also, upon which stand the court house, a hotel and other buildings. It transpires that a portion of the city is built over a cavern.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

T. M. Miller, a Seattle attorney of prominence, has been fined \$25 for slapping his wife.

Seattle citizens returning from the St. Louis fair declare that the joint exhibit of their city and county at the exposition, is a rank failure and does more harm than good.

Eugene has experienced a \$15,000 fire, early Wednesday morning. Several persons had a narrow escape from death by reason of the explosion of a quantity of gun powder in a store.

Columbia river salmon are beginning to run and canneries along the river are preparing to start. The Hurd cannery, at Acme, Or., one of the largest, will begin operations Monday.

The Umpqua Coal Company, of Roseburg, has filed articles of incorporation. The capital stock is half a million. The company claims to own a coal deposit, second only to the mines of Coos county.

It is believed that the Bremerton navy yard that Captain W. T. Burnell, recently in command of the battleship Oregon, will be returned to that place. Captain Burnell formerly had charge of the Bremerton station.

A deed conveying 2065 acres of timber land in the Roseburg land district has just been filed at the Douglas county recorder's office. The transfer is made by the Northern Pacific railway to the Weyerhaeuser syndicate. The consideration is \$10,324.65.

Antone Wehoo, an Austrian, has been rearrested at Black Diamond, Wash., on a charge of having murdered John Sketisher. When the crime was committed Wehoo and Sketisher's widow were charged with the deed, but were released because of lack of evidence. The sheriff at Black Diamond claims to have fresh evidence concerning Wehoo's guilt.

WILL MANAGE HOME

REV. A. R. OLDS WILL HAVE CHARGE STUBBLEFIELD HOME

During Recent Visit East He Visited Several Institutions of the Kind to Familiarize Himself With Work—Place Will Open Soon.

Walla Walla, Sept. 2.—A. R. Olds is busily engaged in preparing for the opening of the Stubblefield Home for Widows and Orphans. The exact date of the opening of the home will be determined upon at a meeting of the trustees tomorrow. A \$2000 heating plant is being installed and the building put in proper condition for the reception of inmates. There is a large number of applicants.

Mr. Olds will hold the position of superintendent and Mrs. Olds will be matron. During their recent visit East they inspected a number of institutions similar to the Stubblefield, and gained some good ideas concerning the best method of managing them.

"Our trip East," said Mr. Olds, "was primarily to visit our old home in Indiana, which we had not seen for 23 years. I noticed many changes that had taken place during my absence, but in a general way conditions were much the same as when I left there nearly a quarter of a century ago. My home city, Fort Wayne, had made some progress and changes were to be noted on all sides so that it seemed unlike the place I remembered it to be.

"At the different public institutions we inspected we had an opportunity to study the best and latest methods in vogue and gained many excellent ideas. We talked to people who have had 25 to 30 years' experience and whose knowledge is most valuable. In all instances they were very kind and obliging and freely gave us all the information we asked for. We gained ideas and information that will add us very materially in the management of the Stubblefield from the very beginning."

INDIAN BOY ESCAPES.

Albert Mary, a Umatilla, Runs Away From Chemewa School.

On Friday or Saturday of last week Albert Mary, a Umatilla boy at the Indian school, escaped from that institution and has disappeared. He had been in the guardhouse for some offense and was taken out and put to work with the threshers, from which labor he made his escape, says the Salem Statesman.

He took refuge with some Greeks who are working on the Southern Pacific railroad, and remained with them in hiding for a day or two. When he finally disappeared from there he is said to have taken some of the Greeks' money and some other things.

The Greeks naturally were incensed, and one story has it, and the teller claims to have been an eye witness, that the Greeks chased the boy into the timber, but this is denied by the authorities at the school. It is supposed that the boy has started towards his home at Umatilla.

IN ARTESIAN DISTRICT.

Colfax People Interested in Land Near Artesian Wells at Castle Rock.

W. Frank Crowe, an attorney of Walla Walla, was in Pendleton last night on his way home from Arlington, Or. Mr. Crowe has been engaged in looking after the title to land in Castle Rock. "There are about 1500 acres of land under the Pilot Rock artesian well," said Mr. Crowe, "and a number of Colfax people intend to settle on. A town site may be laid out."

It is the intention of the Colfax colony to sink a number of wells, and they feel confident of being able to secure plenty of water for irrigation purposes.

Mr. Crowe said he heard but little talk concerning the branch line of the O. R. & N. company to Condon. "The people of Arlington," he continues, "believe that the line will be constructed. Some building material is going in."

NEW INSTRUCTOR ARRIVES.

A. B. Bates to Have Charge Commercial Department in Business College.

A. B. Bates of Audubon, Iowa, has arrived in this city to take charge of the commercial department of the Pendleton business college. The fall term at the business college opens Tuesday, September 6.
