Cloudburst & Sumpter.
The "oldest inhabitant" will have to stretch his memory and his conscience to fix the date which will eclipse the rain, thunder and hailstorm which shed its venom over the hills on which Sumpter rests, yesterday afternoon. For the better part of the dark day clouds came out of the horizon and predictions of rain were numerous. That its volume would be so great no one conceived. For fully half an hour there was such a torrential downpour as to clog all gutters and natural spillways. Old roofs were given supreme tests and stand up under them. At Bergman's and McDevitt & White's, damage was done through letting back doors remain open and volumes of water poured in. Thirty sacks of flour and some canned goods were damaged at the former place.

The fresher which followed the downpour affected the pipe line of the power station, and for about four hours the electric glim was down to a minimum.—Sumpter Reporter.

Spokane Man Murdered.
Jamieson Hyde, a well known laborer of Spokane, was found dead in St. Cloud, Minn., on August 19. The man was on his way east to meet his aged mother, who had preceded him. It is very likely he was murdered. He was discovered lying alongside the Northern Pacific tracks with a large caliber bullet hole in his head. Just how and when the shooting took place is a mystery. The body had not gotten cold when the man was found.—Spokane Press.

Cougar at Touchet.
A ferocious cougar, long, lean and powerful, prowling along the Touchet and now and again getting an attacking dog or an innocent pig, has

been of considerable interest to some of our citizens during the past two weeks. Of course, in this wild and woolly west a cougar is a very ordinary sort of a critter. Many of us are accustomed to having cougar on toast every morning for breakfast. This particular cougar, however, is something out of the ordinary; he is such a big fellow, and those old, yellow eyes of his have such a hungry, yearning look, and he makes the night verily shudder with his awful howl; then again he appears and disappears with mysterious suddenness.—Prescott Spectator.

Monument to Boise Man.
The most expensive monument ever brought to this part of the state is being unloaded today by the White Line Transfer Company. It was purchased by the Falk estate and will mark the last resting place of Nathan Falk. It consists of a mammoth column of granite in three sections. These base weighs 62,000 pounds and required one of the best cars on the Short Line for its transportation. The second section weighs 42,000 and the top section weighs 30,000 pounds. The three pieces of stone made three carloads. The monument will be erected at once in the Masonic cemetery.—Boise Capital News.

Will Reclaim 10,000 Acres.
Hubbard lake, one of the largest of the reservoirs now being put in on the New York canal extension, is now nearly half completed. Sixteen thousand cubic yards of dirt were put into the dam this month. The dam is to be a mile in length, and the reservoir will have a capacity of 10,000 acre feet. The Kuna and Catherine reservoirs are now well filled with water, so that settlers in that section will not suffer if the river should get low.—Boise Capital News.

MARKET REVIEWED

Portland, Sept. 2.—A peculiarity of the live-stock market is the torpor of dressed pork and veal. Both are hard to dispose of, while the former shows a pronounced drop in prices and demand. Moreover, there is practically a cessation of live hogs arriving, while the supply of live hogs is slightly in excess of the local demand either for food storage or immediate local consumption. Practically the same condition exists in regard to sheep.

The official ruling prices are:

Hogs—Best heavy, \$5.50 @ \$6.00; best, \$5.25 @ \$5.50; China fats, \$5 @ \$5.50; stockers and feeders, \$3.95 @ \$4.

Sheep—Best grain-fed wethers and rams, \$2 @ \$2.50; mixed sheep, \$1.75 @ \$2.
