### DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE.

Attendance Large and Enthusiasm Great at Baker City.

Baker City, Sept. 3.—The South-eastern Oregon convention of the Oregon Development League convened in this city this morning.

Last night a delegation from Huntington, headed by Colonel J. H. Aitken, arrived to show the people of Eastern Oregon that Huntington could always be depended on in putting her shoulder to the wheel and help make Oregon one of the great states of the American Union.

The Sumpter Valley train had on board a representative crowd from the Hill Town that always do things. The 10:30 train last night brought prominent men from all along the line to the city to represent the counties all the way between this county and the coast.

A special committee of citizens headed by Mayor Carter, were at the depot in carriages this forenoon when the east-bound passenger rolled in to meet a special delegation of distinguished visitors. Among them were A. L. Craig, the general passenger agent of the O. R. & N. company; Hon. W. M. Calk, ex-county judge of Multnomah county, and a lawyer of marked ability. Hon. E. L. Smith, of Hood River, who is recognized as one of the ablest debaters and most convincing orators in the state of Oregon.

H. E. Dosch was one the train. It is to be regretted that Mr. Dosch could not be with us today, as he is considered one of the most experienced men in the country as to managing matters of this kind.

### MAY REGISTER AGAIN.

Question Developed by Direct Primaries Law.

Portland, Sept. 3.—An interesting question as to registration has been brought to the attention of County Clerk Fields; whether a man must register again for the presidential election on account of the enactment of the direct primary law.

Some lawyers contend that the voter must register a second time, that is, register again, since the passage of the law, but County Judge Webster and Mr. Fields hold a different opinion. Judge Webster says that a second registration will not be ordered by the county court, and Mr. Fields says that his office will have nothing to do with such a move.

Registration books for the Presidential election will be opened by County Clerk Fields on September 20. During the month, voters who failed to register before the state election and those who registered but have changed their residence since then will be given a chance to register.

An opinion by the attorney general may be asked for, but if given, it probably would not do any good, because the last one handed down on election matters was thrown into the waste basket by many officers of the counties of the state.

### GREAT NORTHERN SURVEYORS.

Hill Shows Signs of Invading New Territory.

Hood River, Sept. 3.—Last week a party of surveyors from Seattle, headed by J. F. Blakemore, crossed to the Washington side of the Columbia to Glenwood, in Western Klickitat county, where they took pack horses for the interior. It was thought at the time the party was Northern Pacific surveyors.

Yesterday James Langille returned from the McCoy creek mines, on the headwaters of the Cowlitz, and reported that this same surveying party is at work in the Clepus pass, and that a similar party is working west from the Yakima country. He was told the party was in the employ of the Great Northern railway.
