GENERAL NEWS.

The census just completed gives the population of France as 38,961,954, or a gain of but 444,613 in 10 years. Armenians raided the town of Van in Turkey, Sunday, killing about 20 Turks, who besieged the buildings in which the Armenians were barricaded. President Gompers has refused to call a conference of the federation of labor to take action on a sympathetic strike with the packing house employees.

The Pacific States Mercantile Company, of San Francisco, buncoed Seattle capitalists out of about \$100,000 last week, before they found out they were being robbed.

Four people were killed in a tenement house fire in New York City, Saturday night, in which several buildings in a thickly populated portion of the city were burned.

Tatham Brothers, of New York, the oldest shoe manufacturing concern in the United States, has been absorbed by the United Lead Company, at \$1,000,000. It is a cash trust, now.

The sugar freight rate war from the East to Chicago and Missouri river points has ended, the companies reaching an agreement to continue the old rate of 37 cents to Missouri river points and 47 cents from New Orleans to Kansas jobbing points.

Major General McArthur, commanding the department of California, recommends in his annual report that the government take immediate steps to pay the returning Philippine soldiers immediately upon their discharge, and then take further steps to get them out of San Francisco before the bunco men and sharks get their money from them, as most of the soldiers who land in that city are stranded by the swindlers who lie in wait for them.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The grand jury of Silver Bow county, Montana, has returned 20 indictments against county officials for pilfering the public treasury.

The forest fires on the Nahalem are burning so furiously that green timber is being destroyed. It is the most disastrous fire for 14 years in that vicinity.

The sheriff of Lake county is said to have secured the names of the sheep killers who committed the crimes at Benjamin Lake, earlier in the season.

An unknown young man was found dead in a city park at The Dalles, Saturday night, having taken carbolic acid. He is thought to have been an ex-convict because of the prison clothes he wore.

The livestock men of Malheur county have organized a protective association to rid the country of horse thieves. T. W. Halliday, president, First Bank of Vale, vice president, and J. S. Edwards, of Bell, secretary.

The Oregon City woolen mills advertised free transportation to expert spinners who would come to the mills permanently, and two young men from Indiana accepted the offer. They worked two days in the mills and then mysteriously disappeared.

Last week a company of show people having a cage of 20 snakes, were prevented from exhibiting in Forest Grove because they refused to pay the license. To get even on the city the company disbanded and turned the snake menagerie loose in town. Some of the specimens were of great length.

LABOR CELEBRATES

PENDLETON UNIONS GIVE GRAND BALL TONIGHT.

Labor Conditions in Pendleton Are Ideal—Eight Labor Organizations Here With Membership of Over 200—Several Unions Have Lapsed—Officers of the Federated Trades Council.

The observance of Labor Day in Pendleton is an affair not out of the ordinary. A majority of the stores closed their doors before noon, the county offices and the postal department are enjoying the holiday, but there is no demonstration by the local unions. Tonight at Music hall a dance will be given by the federated trades council.

There are eight labor organizations in Pendleton, with a total membership of over 200. The strongest is the Retail Clerks' International Protective Association. The local unions comprise the following: Typographical, carpenters and joiners, painters, paper hangers and decorators, butchers and meat cutters, plumbers, retail clerks, blacksmiths and teamsters.

Since the first labor union was organized in Pendleton there has been no trouble between employers and the associations. Recently the retail clerks asked that the clothing and dry goods houses be closed at 6 o'clock on all week days except Saturday, beginning the first of September, and the request was readily granted.

At the present time the butchers and meat cutters and the blacksmiths are not on the active list, but they still retain their charters. The federated trades council is officered at present by the following:

President, E. Wisdom, of the carpenters; vice president, Ed Eben, of the retail clerks; financial secretary, W. G. Hodder, of the carpenters; recording secretary, Win Brown, of the printers.

FIRE BOAT FAILED.

Portland's New Investment Was Not Handled Properly in Saturday Night's Fire.

In the river front fire in Portland on Saturday evening, in which about \$50,000 worth of property belonging to machine shops and wholesale houses was destroyed, the "George H. Williams," Portland's new fireboat, utterly failed to extinguish the fire, because of the incompetency of a stoker on board.

The fire department was on the scene pouring streams of water into the burning buildings, and the boat, which hurried to the fire, stood off in the river, helpless to check the flames, although the opportunity was the best possible for a fine display of its efficiency.

A stoker on board the boat whose duty it was to keep up a head of steam to run the pumps, has failed to start a fire under one of the main boilers, and the boat went into action with a cold boiler, and had to wait for the steam pressure to raise before taking part.

When the boat finally came into service the display was beautiful and effective, but the property loss was three times what it would have been had the boat been ready for action on arriving at the fire.

The great streams of water playing from the boat immediately checked the flames, and under proper direction and skillful operation, the boat is capable of extinguishing almost any kind of a fire within her reach.

The Pendleton contingent in Portland saw the fire and witnessed the trial of the fireboat.

Labor Day at Chicago.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—In view of the unusual number of unemployed workmen and the state of public feeling growing out of the packers' strike, extraordinary precautions were taken to prevent disorder at the Labor Day celebration in Chicago today. The parade was the largest of its kind seen here in many years. It was led by the Teamsters' Joint Council, with its 52 local unions and 35,000 members.
