TEMPLARS PARADE

CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO

IS IN GALA ATTIRE.

Parade Consisted of Twelve Divisions—California Commandery of San Francisco One of the Striking Features—Sidewalks Filled With People Who Cheered the Glittering Cavalcade as it Passed Through the Wide Avenues.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 6.—Ten thousand Knights Templar representing every section of the United States together with distinguished delegations from Canada and England, marched in procession through the streets of San Francisco today and were heartily cheered by one of the largest crowds ever seen in this city. The parade was the grand spectacular feature of the triennial convocation now in progress.

The parade consisted of 12 grand divisions, headed by a company of mounted police, commanded by Sir Knight George E. Wittman, chief of police of San Francisco. Sir Charles D. Clark was his chief of staff. Eight of the 12 divisions were made up of the visiting commanderies, while the remaining four consisted of the various commanderies of California.

The Sir Knights of San Francisco, San Jose, Sacramento, Alameda, Oakland and other nearby cities, turned out in full force. The music was furnished by more than a score of bands. With their snow-white helmets and gayly-colored plumes, their elaborately embroidered sashes and flashing swords, the 10,000 marching Templars made up a spectacle that will not soon be forgotten by the tens of thousands of spectators who lined the sidewalks and filled the windows, doors and balconies along the entire route.

A striking feature of the parade was the cavalcade of mounted knights including California Commandery of San Francisco, DeWitt Clinton Commandery of Virginia City, Nev., and Corinthian Chasseur Commandery of Philadelphia.

The carriages contained Sir Henry Bates Stoddard, grand master of the United States; the Earl of Euston, grand master of the great priory of England and Wales; Sir George May, new Moulton, deputy grand master; Sir Charles F. Master, great vice-chancellor of the great priory, and other officers of the grand encampment and the great priory. Golden Gate commandery, Sir P. D. Code commanding, acted as special escort to the grand encampment and visitors from other jurisdictions in carriages.

Templar's Prize Drill

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 6.—On the green sward of Golden Gate Park's nine-diamond baseball field this morning the four crack drill corps of

the Knights Templar met in competition for the prizes hung up.

The great oval, surrounded by sloping banks, bordered by shrubbery and giant trees, made a magnificent amphitheater for the drill. The banks were jammed with spectators and others found good points of vantage in carriages on the drives.

The appearance of the first team was the signal for applause, continued until the corps commander gave the order that started his men in their evolutions. The teams worked in splendid form, their exertions rendered less fatiguing than in previous drills in Eastern cities by the pleasant ocean breeze.

The competing teams were St. Bernard of Chicago, De Molay of Louisville, Ky., Malta of Binghamton, N. Y., and Ivanhoe of Milwaukee. The judges were army officers from the Presidio.

At the conclusion of the competitive drill two local drill corps gave exhibitions after which the judges announced their decision.
