C. R. & N. TAX CASE

J. W. Morrow Now in the City Ready to Argue Assessment Tomorrow.

J. W. Morrow has arrived for the C. R. & N. company in a suit for the purpose of appearing before the county court tomorrow in the matter of an petition asking for an equalization of the county's assessment. The result is assessed at \$12,000 a mile and the railway asks that it be reduced to \$100 a mile, the same as 1902.

Today is the last day for the hearing of the arguments in the suit of the C. R. & N. company against Assessor C. P. Smith and the court is expected to render its decision on the railroad assessment.

The matter has been further postponed by the voluntary action of Circuit Judge Hill, who has prevented the court from rendering its decision on the railroad assessment.

The matter came up for argument three weeks ago, but a continuance was made until September 3.

BUSINESS COLLEGE OPENS

Modern School of Commerce Begins Its Fourth Year Term Today.

The Modern School of Commerce, Pendleton's business college, opened for the year's work this morning. A large number of inquiries have been received from prospective students and before the week is over it is expected the enrollment will be larger than ever before.

The faculty of the school this year consists of E. M. Churchill, principal; A. E. Bates of Astoria, Iowa, commercial department; and H. W. Churchill, bookkeeper and typewriter. This is the beginning of the fourth year of the school's existence. Night school will open October 1, with three sessions each week on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

The opening of the business college at La Grange, said Mr. Churchill, "is expected to give us a number of students from the Grange section."

TO FURNISH LIGHTS

PRESTON-PARTON COMPANY HAS SUB-FRANCHISE.

New Mill Will Be Ready for Operation as Soon as Power Plant is Completed—Will Be 400 Barrel Capacity, to Be Operated by Electricity and Will Consume More Wheat Than Now Comes to Athena Warehouse.

The Preston-Parton Milling Company, comprising a party out of the new electric light and power system, will put up the mill at Athena to furnish a sub-franchise of three miles, having secured the franchise for both places and furnishing all subscribers with light and power. Later on, when the demand has developed sufficient to warrant, the company will move to Athena.

It is stated that the milling company, as a matter of fact, is not the entire contribution of light and power from Athena to Pendleton, with a reservation which will give it control of all franchises developing laterally from the line now being built.

The Preston-Parton Company's new mill at Athena will be operated by electricity, a fact not generally known, deriving all the power from the new line, and will have an entire complement of machinery fully equipped and in readiness by the time the system is completed, which will not likely be earlier than the first of January.

The company lately bought of T. J. Kirk a house of ground which had been upon which to build a power house which is now being built, and the arrangements on the mill give it a capacity of 400 barrels per day, which is below the amount that can be produced from the average amount of wheat which now comes into Athena.

Two engines have been added to the mill, besides the stipula containing the contract.

The Preston-Parton Company owns 10000 acres of wheat land at the vicinity of Wabburg, and is said to control the wheat market at this point.
