

RESUME OF OREGON'S GAME LAWS

Following is a brief resume of Oregon's game laws, which will be found valuable to the readers of the East Oregonian:

Mammals.
 Beaver—Closed for 17 years.
 Spotted Fawn—Closed at all times.
 Antelope, buck deer, moose, mountain sheep (except in the counties of Grant, Harney, Malheur and Baker) closed from November 1 of each year to July 15 of the following year.

Female Deer—Closed from November 1 of each year to August 15 of the following year. In the counties of Grant, Harney, Malheur and Baker, deer and antelope hunting closed from October 15 of each year to October 1 of the following year. Night hunting and use of dogs in hunting deer, antelope or moose are prohibited within the state at all times. Not more than five deer may be killed by any one person during an open season.

Elk—Closed until September 15, 1907; then closed between October 15 of each year and September 15 of the following year. Limit: One elk during each open season. It is unlawful to sell, or have in possession for sale, any elk meat at any time. It is unlawful at any time to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, any deer, elk, moose, mountain sheep or spotted fawn, for the purpose of obtaining the skin, hide, horns, horns or other flesh of such animals for the purpose of sale, barter, exchange or trade, except upon permission from the state game and forestry warden.

Silver Gray Squirrel—Closed from January 1 to October 1 of each year.

Water Fowl.
 Ducks, Geese, Swan—Limit: 100 in one week and not more than 50 in one day for one man.

The law prohibits the use of sink boxes, sink boats, snook boats, skiffs, batteries, swivel guns, fire, flashlights and blinds but the provisions of the law differ for particular sections of the state.

Ducks, Geese, Swan—Except in the counties of Jackson, Klamath, Lake and Coos—Closed season from March 1 to September 1 of each year. Hunting of wild geese is prohibited at all times on any island or sandbar on which wild geese habitually roost or rest, in or along the Columbia river east of the Cascade mountains. In the counties of Jackson, Klamath and Lake, season closed from January 1 to September 15 of each year. In Coos county, season closed from February 1 to August 1 of each year.

Water Rail and Upland Plover—Closed from January 1 to August 1 of each year.

Upland Birds.
 Limit—Ten birds in one day. There are provisions against trans-

ping, netting, ensnaring, robbing nests, and placing of poisoned wheat, and against trespass, which apply to all sections of the state.

Sale of grouse, pheasants and quail is permitted during the last 15 days of the open season, subject, however, to the restrictions placed upon hunting in the different sections of the state. A record must be kept of each sale.

English or gray partridge, capercaillie, moorhen, wild turkey, woodcock, silver pheasant, golden pheasant, copper pheasant, green Japanese pheasant and Reeves pheasant, closed until October 1, 1905.

Prairie chicken, grouse, native pheasant or ruffed grouse, ring-necked or China torquatus pheasant, quail, Bob White quail, blue grouse, partridge, sagehen and sagecock (except as indicated below), closed from December 1 of each year to October 1 of the following year.

Wasco County—Prairie chickens and quail, closed from October 15 of each year to August 1 of the following year, and at all times when the ground is covered with snow sufficient for tracking.

Tillamook County—Native pheasant (or ruffed grouse) and ring-necked or China torquatus pheasant, closed until September 15, 1904; then closed between December 1 of each year and September 15 of the following year. **Blue Grouse**—Closed from October 15 of each year to August 1 of the following year.

Counties of Josephine, Jackson, Coos, Curry and Clatsop—Ring-necked or China torquatus pheasant, closed until September 15, 1906; then closed between December 1 of each year and September 15 of the following year.

Douglas County—The law is not clear as to this county. See section 2020 of Bellinger & Cotton's Code.

East of Cascade mountains (except Wasco county)—Pheasant (except native pheasant or ruffed grouse) and quail (except Bob White quail), closed at all times. Sagehen, sagecock, grouse, native pheasant or ruffed grouse, closed from November 1 of each year to August 1 of the following year.

Prairie Chicken—Closed until August 15, 1903; then closed from November 15 of each year to August 15 of the following year. **Bob White quail**, except in Klamath and Lake counties, closed until October 15, 1905; then closed between December 1 of each year and October 15 of the following year.

Fish.
Black Bass—Open from June 1 to October 1 of each year. Only hook and line may be used.

Trout—May be caught only with hook and line. Limit of size, not less than five inches. Limit of catch, 125 in a day. Night fishing prohibited, except within 10 waters of Coquille

river, but only hook and line may be used. Sale prohibited.

Eastern Brook Trout, Loch Leven Trout and Grayling—Closed until April 1, 1904.

Salmon Trout—Open at all times, except that fishing for salmon trout is restricted to tide waters during the months of November, December, January, February and March of each year.

All other species of Trout—Closed during the months of November, December, January, February and March of each year. The use of dynamite, powder, gas, lime, cocculus indicus, poison, etc., is prohibited. Dynamiting trout and other food fish is made a penitentiary offense. The law also prohibits the dumping of sawdust, planer shavings and lumber waste into trout and salmon streams.

Salmon—size limit, not less than 12 inches. The use of spear, gaff and foul hook is prohibited.

No Fight—Sports Disappointed.
 Philadelphia, Sept. 7.—There is much disappointment in local sporting circles because of the abandonment of the Corbett-O'Brien fight which was to have taken place at the Tuxedo Athletic club tonight. It is likely that an effort will be made to have the city authorities reconsider their refusal to issue a permit so that the bout may be pulled off at a later date.

Montana Republicans.
 Billings, Mont., Sept. 7.—Republicans of Montana assembled in state convention here today and were called to order by Chairman Lindsay of the state committee. The convention will name candidates for the state offices to be filled at the November election, and adopt resolutions endorsing the ticket and platform of the Chicago national convention.
