**NEW ARIZONA PROCESS.**  
Industry May Be Near Being Revolutionized. Philadelphia, Sept. 8.—It is stated that the Midvale Steel Company has a new secret process for making armor plate that ma revolutionize that industry as well as reduce the cost to an extremely low figure. This at least is the belief of experts in the navy department and accounts for the fact that the Midvale has heretofore made bids for government contracts against both the Carnegie and Bethlehem companies, although it had no plant ready for operation at the time of bidding. What the company's new process is has been kept a profound secret, but it is declared that the plates will stand every test required and can be made for perhaps \$100 per ton, whereas the lowest price ever paid before was at least \$400 a ton.
