### BAD RUNAWAY.

Buggy and Harness Belonging to Carney & Kennedy a Total Loss.

The carelessness of a traveling agent for a foreign grocery house, wrecked a carriage and riddled a harness belonging to Carney & Kennedy.

The agent alighted from the buggy three or four miles from Pendleton, near Birch creek, to open a gate, and then started the team up by clucking to them while he held the gate. A hind wheel struck a post, the team kept ahead and jerked the wheel off, which scared the team, which then ran away before the driver could get hold of the reins. They ran two miles and went over the bank into Birch creek, on the McFee place.

The opposite bank was too high to afford them access, and the horses went up the channel about 100 feet and got into a deep hole out of which they could not get, and nearly drowned before they could be gotten out, impeded by the wreckage of the buggy and the harness as they were. Buggy and harness were practically a total loss, but the horses were not injured farther than to be badly winded.

### SHIPPING HORSES.

Carload of Heavy Grade Clydesdales and Percherons.

O. H. Holcomb, the horse buyer, has gotten together a carload of heavy horses from four to nine years of age which are said to be one of the finest lots ever selected for shipment out of this county. Several weigh 1300 pounds each in ordinarily good flesh. They are all grade Clydesdales and Percherons, and cost the buyer from \$125 to \$225 each. They will be shipped to Seattle tomorrow over the W. & C. E., and most of the animals are destined for work in the logging camps and for other heavy lines.

Mr. Holcomb will remain in the county and buy indefinitely—probably as long as the supply of horses holds.

## REDUCED RATES FOR IRRIGATORS

### ONE AND A THIRD FARE TO ONTARIO MEETING.

President Devers, of Oregon Irrigation Association, issues Letter Giving Valuable Information—Over \$1000 in Prizes for Products—Hotel Accommodations Will Be Ample—Practical Demonstration of Irrigation Will Be Shown to Best Advantage.

That the Ontario Irrigation Association will hold a profitable and enthusiastic meeting at Ontario, on September 19, 20 and 21, is shown by the following interesting letter from President A. H. Devers, of the state association:

Portland, Sept. 6, 1904.—(Editor East Oregonian.)—I am requested by A. N. Sells to notify you that the convention of the Oregon Irrigation Association to be held in Ontario, Or., September 19, 20 and 21, is to be favored with reduced rates by the railroads. Full rate going and one-third rate returning.

These rates apply over the O. R. & N. and Oregon Short Line, and it is to be hoped that the Southern Pacific will also make the same rates.

The Irrigation Association has positive promises from the gentlemen named of the attendance of Senator Mitchell, Congressman Williamson and Herrmann, Governor Chamberlain of Oregon, and Governor Morrison of Idaho, Hon. D. W. Ross, U. S. G. S., Mayor Glassman of Ogden, Dr. Wicks, trustee of the Oregon Agricultural College, and numerous others prominent in irrigation work from different sections of the country.

It is especially desired that you give as much publicity as possible to the fact that there will be about 1500 given away in premiums for train displays. The city of Ontario alone will present a \$100 silver loving cup to the county in Oregon making the best fruit exhibit.

The city of Ontario is in shape to take care of the numerous delegation as every private house in the city will be thrown open for the accommodation of guests, and there are besides in the city two large first-class hotels able to take care of several hundred people.

What irrigation can do for a country will be given here a practical demonstration where waterless soil which land will be shown side by side with land worth \$200 and over per acre.

### WESTON NORMAL OUTLOOK.

Vice President Peetles Expects Heavy Attendance for Coming Year.

"I don't know what we are going to do to lodge all the new students," said Mr. Peetles. "We will be able to board them, but our sleeping accommodations are limited. What we need is an appropriation for a new dormitory."
