GENERAL NEWS.

There are now 260,905 Sunday schools in the United States.

The triple alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy is on its last legs.

The Pacific Coast life saving stations are to be supplied with auto boats.

John Pierpont Morgan has just bought four imported colliers for which he paid \$19,000.

Shog Kee, a Chinese farmer, was backed to death with an axe at Oakland, Cal., Saturday night.

Closing down of the McCorinick implement factories in Chicago has thrown 400 out of employment.

Unknown thugs assaulted Editor Crothers of the San Francisco Bulletin on the streets of that city last Saturday night.

The government crop report shows the condition of spring wheat to be but 66 2/3 per cent, as against 87 1/2 per cent on August 1.

Nine men from the mailfield boat Stanley, have been lost in the Arctic while going from the vessel to Umanik Pass in an open boat.

Charles Michaels, a New York bookkeeper, was driven to commit suicide Saturday by the brother of a girl whom Michaels had seduced.

Mrs. Kate Hyland of Westport, Ind., who prevented a serious train wreck last week, is a claimant for a prize from the Carnegie Hero Fund.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A nine-pound radish is one of the wonders produced near Palouse City, Wash., this season. It is of the White China variety.

A district comprising 30,000 acres of supposed oil land near Great Falls, Mont., has just been filed on by a rash of oil speculators.

San Francisco canneries are now paying \$60 per ton for Oregon peaches which are being shipped there from Southern Oregon in large quantities.

Mrs. B. Streeter, who was dragged out of the river, drowning, Sunday morning at Spokane, fought her rescuers, declaring she had studiously prepared to die.

An Indian saved the lives of two men whose boat had capsized in the Pitt river at Redding, Cal., Saturday evening. He swam the torrent and brought both ashore.

The pork packing house at Union was burned Saturday night, together with 25,000 pounds of cured meats, valued at 12 1/2 cents per pound. There was no insurance.

To three dozen bids received for the Oregon building at the St. Louis fair, the highest bid was \$2500. The building will be awarded to the lucky bidder on Tuesday, September 13.

Joe Golden, a thief arrested in Seattle Saturday, in connection with a \$2500 pearl necklace theft, has been connected with 42 burglaries in the past six weeks, this being the record for the Northwest.

The 2-year-old son of C. Ambrosio, of Humboldt county, California, was seized by a panther Saturday morning. The father, who was near at hand, pursued the beast for a mile before it dropped the child, which was uninjured.

APPORTIONMENT OF DELEGATES

TWELFTH NATIONAL IRRIGATION MEET AT EL PASO.

Congress Will Meet on November 15-18, and All Parts of the United States Are Entitled to Representation and Expected to Take Part—Governors Will Appoint 10 Delegates—Commercial Bodies, Cities, County Courts and All Industrial and Commercial Organizations Are Entitled.

The 12th National Irrigation congress will be held at El Paso, Texas, November 15th to 18th inclusive, 1904.

All who are interested in conserving the great natural resources of the country—extending the habitable area—increasing the products of the land—insuring greater stability of prosperous conditions—making occupations upon the land attractive—the extension of internal trade and commerce, and a wider knowledge of a great economic movement which has for its ultimate object the upbuilding of an empire within the borders of a great nation, are invited to attend this congress.

The organization of this congress will be as follows:

The permanent officers of the congress, including the chairman of the sections.

Members of the United States senate and house of representatives.

Governors of states and territories.

Embassadors, ministers and other representatives of foreign nations and colonies.

Members of state and territorial irrigation commissions.

Two delegates, to be appointed by the governor of each state and territory.

Four delegates, to be appointed by the mayor of each city of less than 25,000 population.

Two delegates, each duly accredited by any chamber of commerce, board of trade, commercial club or other commercial body.

Two delegates, each duly accredited by any regularly organized irrigation, agricultural or horticultural society.

Two delegates, each duly accredited by any regularly organized society of engineers.

Two delegates, each duly accredited to any agricultural college, or college or university having a chair of hydraulic engineering, forestry, or other subject related to the general purpose of the congress.

It is respectfully suggested that in the appointment of delegates, persons should be selected who are sincerely interested in and purpose attending the congress, and that appointment be made as early as possible.

Please have full name and postoffice address of delegates mailed to Executive Chairman, 12th N. E. Congress, El Paso, Texas, that they may receive special information which will be mailed to each delegate not later than October 5th, 1904.

ECHO CO-OPERATES.

Delegates to Assist Government in Irrigation Work, Is Named.

In accordance with a general plan adopted by leading cities of the arid sections of Oregon and Washington, to appoint citizens committees to cooperate with the government engineers in securing suitable reservoir sites and water sources for government irrigation, Echo has named such a committee.

At a meeting of the Citizens Club, held Saturday night, a committee consisting of Dr. C. J. Smith, of this city, who is also a land holder of the Echo district, O. D. Teel, J. B. Saylor, F. B. Van Cleave and H. C. Willis was appointed to co-operate with other cities having such committees.

President Borie, of the Commercial Association, of this city, appointed a standing committee for this purpose some time ago. Walla Walla, Colfax, Spokane and Baker City all have such committees.
