### GENERAL NEWS.

Madam Melba, the noted opera singer, while riding in her auto in Paris, Monday, ran down and killed an old man who attempted to cross the road ahead of the machine.

The barber shop of Joe Strivell, an Italian, was blown up with dynamite in New York, Monday, and 29 families in the building were thrown into a panic. A letter from the "Black Hand" preceded the dynamiting.

Japan has agreed that the crews of the dismantled Russian cruisers Askold and Gromov, shall remain on board the vessels until the year ends. The engines are all dismantled. The machine guns stored away in parcels.

St. Petersburg has received the official news from Mukden, that over 10,000 Russian soldiers were wounded in the siege and evacuation of Liao Yang, and that 2,000 dead were left on the route, the armies being unable to bury them.

Two trains of Knights Templar returning from the convolve, collided near McLaughlin, Ark., Monday morning, and 12 members of the party were seriously injured and one engineer and fireman fatally hurt. A misunderstanding of orders caused the wreck.

The Continental Consolidated and the American Tobacco companies have called a joint meeting to be held in New York on September 29, for the purpose of consolidating. This trust will then control the tobacco industry of the world. Headquarters will be in St. Louis.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Oregon City pulp and paper mills use about 15,000,000 feet of logs annually in the manufacture of paper.

Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, has been appointed a member of the National Board of the United Irish League of America.

Harry Ebben, of Tacoma, who was a sufferer from consumption, committed suicide at North Yakima, Monday by shooting himself.

Officer Ole Nelson, of Portland, who was shot by the highwayman, Walton, two weeks ago, is rapidly improving and will soon leave the hospital.

As a result of a family feud in East Portland, a three hours' fight was engaged in Monday afternoon, and three of the combatants are now in jail awaiting trial.

A six-horse, 24-passenger trolley-coach has arrived at St. Louis from the Yellowstone Park. The coach will be used to convey distinguished parties over the grounds.

Thieves are becoming more and more bold in Portland, the residence of Philip Gurvitz, on Seventh street, having been robbed of \$55 in cash Monday in broad daylight.

County Judge Webster, of Multnomah county, has a plan on foot to construct a leading state highway from Portland to the California line, prison labor to be used in its construction.

Sheriff Lawrence, of Malheur county, has abandoned the chase after Hess and Chester, whom he pursued into the Flathead Indian reservation. They are wanted for horse stealing and breaking jail.

Rev. Martini, an Italian preacher, shot a hop-picker named Woolman, near Aurora, Monday morning, because Woolman interfered when Martini beat his children. Woolman was not fatally hurt, Martini fled to the mountains.

## FILLING SLOUGH IN BYERS' GROVE

REQUIRES 61,191 CUBIC YARDS OF EARTH.

Cost of Putting the Land Surrounding the New East End School in Shape Will Be About \$5000—Sewer System and Drainage Will Be Perfect—Site of New School Building Will Be Ideal When Repairs Are Done.

Saturday last a cut was made in the levee near the north end of Jeff Davis street, which extends clear to the foundation, and through it will be hauled the gravel and other material from the river bed for the filling of the Byers slough, the lower end of which is very near the cut mentioned. A force of men and teams with scrapers is at work today and the slough is being actually filled. Later 14 scrapers will be in operation continually until the fill is completed, and it is estimated to take six weeks continual work by this force. Mr. Byers states that the fill will cost between \$4000 and \$5000.

The extent and character of this undertaking is not well understood by many, even among those who have previously crossed the bayou and have considerable knowledge of the topography of the neighborhood.

The layout, which is almost exactly 2500 feet in length from the Jeff Davis street terminus to the city limits on the eastward, comprises between five and six acres of space, says County Surveyor Kimbrell, who surveyed it accurately for the present undertaking, measured its depth and calculated the amount of earth necessary to fill it.

Mr. Kimbrell found one point where the bayou is narrowest—600 feet wide, where the water stands six feet deep at low tide, and of course is of greater depth during the rainy season. At this point the water is practically though not absolutely stagnant.

To fill the bayou to street grade will take 61,191 yards of earth. This includes the entire area of the bayou on the townside—lms, streets and alley.

The outflow from the bayou has always been precarious and incomplete—so much so that there has been no rational denial of the charge that its existence in its present state is a menace to health. The only wonder, perhaps, is that more bad results have not occurred from it than have.

With the filling of the levee according to present plans, and as provided for by the contract and bond of Mr. Byers with the school district, all this will be changed. When there is added to the filling the laying of sewer pipes from the waterworks to and past the new school house and to the river, so that the artificial drainage will be as effective as in any part of the town, the Byers' grove district will be as sanitary as any other locality in the valley within the city's limits.

The new sewer extension to cover this district is approximately 1400 feet in length, and the new school house will be approximately one-half the distance from the lower terminus to the water works or upper terminus. This new avenue for the escape of sewerage will afford an outlet for the spill-water from the water works, which has until now been thrown directly into the slough. This new sewerage will be laid for the most part—or a large part of it, at least, on Lewis street.

### Train Left Him Barcheaded.

Rev. Black, pastor of the St. Francis Catholic church in Portland, was en route a few days ago from St. Louis to Portland and stepped off the train at this place to bid a friend good bye. While in conversation on the north side of the depot the train moved away from the south side and was well past the coal bunkers before Mr. Black realized that he was left. All his baggage including his hat was on the train, and Mr. Black found his way barcheaded to the residence of Father Travelli, with whom he spent the night. Mr. Black was the delegate from Oregon to the National Catholic Knights council at St. Louis.

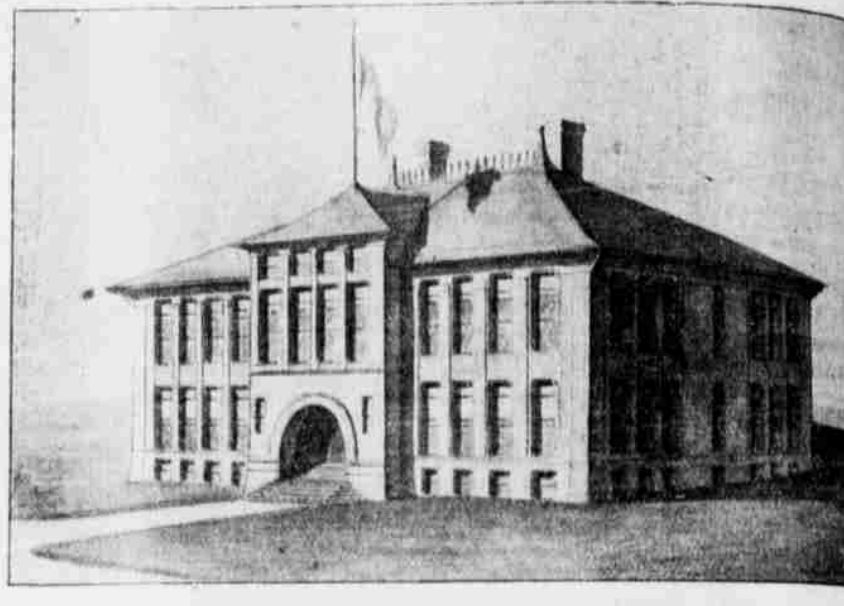
