### GENERAL NEWS.

Russian advances say that all secret communications are now made whereby the commanders of Fort Arthur will blow up every fortification when they see that the port is lost.

James H. Peabody has been renominated for governor of Colorado by the republicans. David H. Moffat, the millionaire railroad owner, leads the presidential elector ticket in the state.

The famous 14th regiment of the Russian army, which won such distinction in holding Shipka Pass in the Russo-Turkish war in 1877, will now go to the Orient to engage the Japanese.

It has been recommended that the present military force in the Philippines be reduced from four regiments of infantry and nine of infantry, to three regiments of cavalry and seven of infantry.

In order to effect an economy of about \$3500 per month, which has been uselessly expended for the past seven months, about 10 employees of the government Philippine exhibit at the St. Louis fair have been discharged.

The famous lawsuit over the split in the republican party in Wisconsin, and the holding of two conventions and nomination of two sets of officers, is now being argued in the supreme court. The La Follett faction has lost a point in the allowance of an amended complaint from the other faction, by the court.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Sheriff Ward, of Multnomah, seized 11 slot machines Thursday, in Portland saloons.

Matt Anderson, a pioneer of Montana, committed suicide by taking carbolic acid Thursday at Missoula.

The steamship Jefferson reached Seattle Thursday, from Skagway, with \$572,000 and 149 passengers on board.

The American ship C. E. Sargent has arrived in Portland from Alaska, with 40,000 cases of canned salmon on board.

It was so dark at Albany at noon Thursday, on account of smoke that the lamps were lighted in almost every home.

Chairman of the state Democratic central committee, Alex Speck, hopes to secure Grover Cleveland for his speech in Oregon during the campaign.

David Chadwick, aged 16, died at Astoria, Thursday, as a result of injuries received in a runaway last week. His skull was split open and his brain exposed.

C. H. McKeague, special commissioner for the Lewis and Clark fair, has gone to St. Louis to select manufacturers' exhibits for the Lewis and Clark exhibit, next year.

Richard Nixon, the Portland attorney, sued by Ditchburn, another attorney for \$50,000 damages to character, has won the case. The court awarding Ditchburn nothing for his alleged injuries.

The Burnside left Tacoma Thursday for Alaska, where she will complete the government cable line from Sitka to Valdez. The government had intended to use the line of the White Pass and Yukon railway, a part of the distance, but that company fixed the price at \$1.20 per word and the government decided to complete the cable rather than be robbed in this manner.

# PACKING HOUSE FOR FRYE-BRUHN

FIRST MEAT CANNERY PLANT IN NORTHWEST.

Built in Seattle at Cost of \$25,000—All kinds of Stable Meats Will Be Produced in Quantity—Output Expected to Reach \$1,000,000—Company Now Kills 300 to 500 Sheep, and 100 to 200 Cattle Daily.

Seattle, Sept. 16.—The first meat canning plant to be established in the Pacific Northwest will be in operation at the Frye-Bruhn company's packing house on or before October 1. It is already completed and represents an outlay of \$25,000. The arrival of tin for the manufacture of cans is all that is now delaying the operation of the plant.

Charles Sautier, a Frenchman who has had years of experience in the meat canning business, will have direct charge of the new branch of the big packing house. He was formerly with the Armour and National packing companies. He is already in Seattle.

Turned beef, prime roast beef and tongue will be the chief canned products put up at the plant. The latter has a capacity of about 2000 cans a day and this output will be increased as the trade is built up. According to Charles H. Frye, president of the company, the quality of the meats put up will be higher than that of the canned goods now sold here by the big eastern packing houses. It is the intention to can only the best beef and to use the finest materials throughout.

The addition of the new branch to the Frye-Bruhn plant will make it one of the largest in the entire west. From 200 to 500 sheep and the same number of pigs are slaughtered there daily, and the number of cattle killed each day is from 100 to 200.

Every meat product from smoked hams and lard to roasts and oil and fertilizer is turned out at the plant, the value of the aggregate output being \$4,000,000 worth of goods every year.

### UMATILLA LEADS.

More Farm Machinery Sold Here Than in Any Other Like Territory.

C. W. Cather, of Portland, manager of the coast branch of Gar, Scott & Co., threshing and sawmill machinery, is in town. He sees more evidences of thrift this year than ever before during the 14 years he has been making this territory—more new buildings, both in town and on the farms and his other firms engaged in the same line of business have sold more machinery in Umatilla county during the past two years than in any four previous years during the past 20 years.

This does not apply to sawmill machinery, the demand for which has fallen off since the denudation of the hills and mountains of timber, but it does apply to threshing machinery, which includes fanning mills and some lines of seeders.

Mr. Cather, moreover, says that no equal area of wheat producing territory in the United States, whether it be in Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota or Washington, consumes as much threshing machinery in a given number of years, or pays for it in as short a time as Umatilla county.

A protested note given by a farmer in this county, or an association of farmers, is almost unknown, and certificates of indebtedness from this county are worth a larger per cent of their face than similar documents from almost any portion of the Union.

### WORLD'S BIGGEST DREDGER.

F. L. Champlin of Gold Hill, Oregon, Tells of Operations.

Fredrick L. Champlin, of Champlin & Company, of Gold Hill, Jackson county, Ore., operators of the largest gold dredger in the world, passed through Pendleton last night on his way to Chicago. The Champlin holdings are near Grants Pass, and about 15 miles from Big Creek, where a rich strike was made several months ago.

"We are working over about 2500 cubic yards of earth daily," said Mr. Champlin, "and clean up from \$1500 to \$2000 a week. The region is unquestionably a rich one. We have been operating there since a year ago last February.

"I am going to be absent in the east about a month and will then return to Southern Oregon."
