GENERAL NEWS.

The Sawyer & Austin sawmill at Pine Bluff, Ark., the largest plant in the South, has been destroyed by fire. Loss, about \$500,000.

Japan believes that the Russians are testing the feeling in the United States, by sending the Lena to the harbor of San Francisco, to ask for repairs.

It is said Japan will give the Liao Tung peninsula to China, after the fall of Port Arthur. Russia seized this peninsula from China about eight years ago.

The city marshal of Coshocton, O., instantly killed five rats, Thursday night, while the latter was engaged in boring into a bank safe. The pairs of rats escaped.

Wind which shifted the direction of the force fire in the city of Halifax, Friday, saved the city from utter destruction. The loss was about \$500,000 as it was.

Montana forest fires are raging in the finest bodies of pine timber left standing on the Rocky mountains, and only heavy rains can save vast areas from destruction.

Peter Dalia, an Italian saloon-keeper, was assassinated at Silverton, Col., Friday. His body was found in his room horribly mutilated. There is no clue to his murderers.

The Pullman car shops at Chicago have closed down and 7000 men are idle. It is presumed that the shops are closed for repairs to machinery, but alleged inside information says it is for the purpose of killing the labor unions in the shops. None will be employed on reopening except those recommended by the Manufacturers' Association, the arch-enemy of labor.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Washington county assessments increased from \$71,785,784 in 1932, to \$74,429,852 in 1934.

The young man who committed suicide at The Dalles last week, by drinking carbolic acid, has been identified as Fred Arns, of Etna, Wash.

Six parties will vote at the presidential election in the state of Washington—democrat, republican, socialist, socialist-labor, prohibition and populist.

The headless body of an unknown man was found Friday morning beside the Northern Pacific tracks near Olympia. The man had evidently been killed by a train.

Mrs. F. A. Wolfe and daughter Belle, of Falls City, Polk county, won the first prize at the state fair for that county by their excellent exhibit of agricultural products at the fair.

The food commissioner of the state of Washington, has threatened to seize and destroy the product of the Oregon Evaporated Cream Company, but Washington dealers are handling large quantities of it.

Freddie Dardine, a 9-year-old school boy, was shot accidentally and almost instantly killed Thursday night by an old man living alone in a cabin in the woods near Nooksack, Wash. The boy picked up the gun, and the old man in grabbing it forcibly from his hands, discharged it.

The body of George Bright, who was drowned at Riparia, on August 29, while crossing Snake river in a small boat, has been discovered at Scott Island, 30 miles below Riparia. The body will be buried in Walla Walla. Brothers of the young man came from California to make the search for the body.

MEETING CONVENES AT ONTARIO MONDAY.

Elaborate Program Has Been Arranged for the Three Days—Congressmen Hermann and Williamson on the Program for Speeches—Lunch Will Be Served in Grove at Arcadia—Ample Accommodation for All Comers.

Ontario, Sept. 17.—The third annual convention of the Oregon State Irrigation Association will convene at the opera house in this city next Monday, September 19, at 10 a. m. and it is anticipated that the largest number of visitors and representative men of the arid sections of Oregon and Idaho and other Western states ever assembled in Ontario will be present. The session will last three days and will close with a picnic at the Arcadia grove and an excursion to the fish hatchery.
