CARPENTERS MEET

ANNUAL CONVENTION UNITED BROTHERHOOD.

Will Be in Session Two Weeks With Delegates From All Over the United States and Canada, Porto Rico and the Hawaiian—Will Discuss Question of Permitting Political Discussion in the Subordinate Unions—Has Gained 45,000 Members During Past Two Years.

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 19.—The United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America met here today in biennial convention. Between 200 and 400 delegates filled the West Side Turner hall when the convention was called to order by President William Huber. In addition to the delegates from all parts of the country those present included delegates from Canada, Porto Rico and the Hawaiian Islands. After the addresses of welcome and responses and the appointment of the usual committees the convention adjourned until tomorrow. The body will be in session two weeks, but after today all sessions will be executive.

The convention has an unusual amount of important business to transact. First and foremost on the agenda is the proposition to amalgamate with the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners, an English organization with a membership of 3500 in this country. Another important matter before the convention is the question of permitting political discussions in the various local chapters of carpenters' unions throughout the country. Should the question be decided in the affirmative the result would be that the brotherhood would have to sever its relations with the American Federation of Labor, as the latter organization permits no union affiliated with it to allow political discussions of any nature during the meetings.

The San Jose, Cal., local union will propose an amendment providing that no shop or mill shall be entitled to the label of the brotherhood unless it has an eight-hour workday, and a minimum pay equal to the minimum rate paid by union shops in the same locality. Another amendment to the constitution will be submitted by the local union of Seattle, which provides that all strikes brought about by differences existing between trade unions shall not be sanctioned by the executive board nor shall they receive financial aid from the general office.

The report of General Secretary Frank Duffy shows a total membership of 191,205, an increase of about 45,000 since the last convention. Secretary Duffy will probably be re-elected without opposition. Among

those mentioned by the socialists to oppose the re-election of President Huber are John McLain of Denver, Sidney J. Kent of Omaha, and John W. Slattery of Newcastle, Pa.

ART AND SCIENCES.

Convention of Educational Specialists at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 19.—Great Britain, Germany, France, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and Holland are among the foreign countries represented at the congress of arts and sciences, which began a week's session at the exposition today. In regard to its personnel the assembly is by far the most notable of its kind ever held in this country. The leading universities and colleges of the United States and Canada are well represented.

The idea of the present congress grows out of the thought that the subdivision and multiplication of specialties in science has reached a stage at which investigators and scholars may derive both inspiration and profit from a general survey of the various fields of learning, planned with a view of bringing the scattered sciences into closer mutual relations. Leading representatives of theoretical and applied sciences are expected to set forth these general principles and fundamental conceptions which connect groups of sciences, review the historical development of special sciences, show their mutual relations, and discuss their present problems.

NEW YORK DEMOCRATS.

Factional Fight May Result in Compromise for Governor.

Saratoga, N. Y., Sept. 19.—On the eve of the democratic state convention, which assembles here tomorrow for the nomination of a state ticket, all indications point to an interesting and lively gathering. The hotel corridors are already thronged with politicians, though the majority of the delegates will not reach town until tomorrow morning.

Edward M. Shepard, backed by the endorsement of Daniel S. Lamont, is the man most mentioned for the gubernatorial nomination, though many of the friends of ex-Senator David B. Hill are still standing loyally by the candidacy of John B. Stanchfield. District Attorney Jerome, who aspires to head the ticket, stands high in the favor of up-state leaders, but the bitter opposition of Tammany Hall is regarded as sufficiently strong to put a quietus to his ambition. Charles W. Goodyear of Buffalo, is believed to stand some show as a compromise candidate.
