The convention has an important business to problems. transact. First and foremost on the agenda is the proposition to amalganate with the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners, an English organization with a membership of 3599 in this country. Another important matter before the convention is the question of permitting political discussions in the various lodecided in the affirmative the re-American Federation of Labor. as the latter organization permits no tomorrow morning, union affiliated with it to allow political discussions of any nature during the meetings.
