Chemical Experiments in Life, Food, Anatomy and Diseases of Co-Sent There.

The first scientific investigation of the life and habits of the Columbia fiver salmon is now being made by the United States government through the bureau of fisheries.

Michitaro Sindo, a Japanese BUIdent of Stanford University, is now located at Ontario, completing the salmon investigations for the United States government. These investigations were begun early last spring on the lower Columbia and were followed up in all the successive stages of the salmon run from the mouth of the river to Ontario, where the last work is being done

Sindo is a highly educated man 30 years of age, and an expert chemist. He is equipped with a full laboratory of scientific instruments and paraphernalia and is conducting the most intricate chemical analysis of the salmon's anatomy, composition, food and diseases, and will report to the bureau of fisheries, which will place his report on file as part of the government records.

Sindo will also report to the Japanese government on the possibility of introducing the chinook salmon into Japan. The only species of salmon now found in that country is the "dog" salmon, which is used in great quantities.

If he finds from the investigation that the Chinook would thrive in Japanese streams, he will make arrangements to ship several hundred million eggs there for propagation.
