King Peter is descended from Karageorge, a peasant, who was the leader of the insurrection against Turkey in 1804. He resigned as Prince of Serbia from 1804 to 1813, when he was supplanted by the Obrenovic during a second insurrection.

**New Bishop of Great Falls.**  
 Dubuque, Iowa, Sept. 21.—The consecration of the Rev. Father Matthias C. Linehan to the new Roman Catholic bishopric of Great Falls, Mont., took place in the cathedral of St. Raphael today. The services began at 10:30 o'clock. The church edifice was crowded, and the greatest interest was manifested in the proceedings, which were the most elaborate of the kind ever seen here. The consecration ceremony was performed by Archbishop Keane, who was assisted by several bishops and a large number of priests.

**To Succeed Bishop Dudley.**  
 Louisville, Ky., Sept. 21.—The Episcopal diocesan council of Kentucky met today to agree upon a successor of the late bishop T. U. Dudley. Those most prominently mentioned for the honor are Rev. Nathaniel S. Thomas, rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles of Philadelphia, and the Rev. John Poyntz Tyler, archdeacon of the diocese of Virginia.

**Fairbanks at Reading.**  
 Reading, Pa., Sept. 21.—The annual convention of the Pennsylvania State League of Republican Clubs began in the Academy of Music here today and will continue through tomorrow. Several hundred delegates, representing more than one hundred clubs, were in attendance. The day's proceedings were largely of a routine nature. Interest centers chiefly in the mass meeting tonight, which will mark the formal opening of the national campaign in this state. Senator Fairbanks, Senator Penrose and Governor Pennypacker are among the scheduled speakers.

**Wanted, Stitch Counters.**  
 New York, Sept. 21.—The United States civil service commission held an examination in this city today for the position of "stitch counter," which is the most difficult place to fill in the whole civil service. A stitch counter is expected to count the stitches per square inch in imported lace and embroidery with a view to fixing the ad valorem duty. The position pays \$900 a year and the work is done with a magnifying glass.

**Scottish Rite Masons Meet.**  
 Boston, Mass., Sept. 20.—The 92d annual meeting of the Supreme Council, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, began in Boston today. Tonight the 33d, or honorary, degree will be conferred. The 27th annual meeting Provincial Grand Lodge, Order of Scotland, of the United States, will open here tomorrow. Both gatherings will be attended by the Earl of Euston and the other members of the Masonic delegation which came over from England to attend the Knights Templar conclave at San Francisco.

**Old-Time Telegraphers.**  
 Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 20.—Men who sat at the key when telegraphy was in its infancy are gathered in Atlanta in attendance on the 24th annual reunion of the Old-Time Telegraphers and Historical Association. New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburgh and other cities are represented at the reunion, which will last through the remainder of the week. The meeting is purely in the nature of a reunion and has little business to transact.

**Kansas Photographers.**  
 Topeka, Kan., Sept. 20.—The tenth annual convention of the Kansas Photographers' Association began in Topeka today with an attendance of representative members of the profession from all over the state. A banquet at the National hotel ushers in the formal program this evening and the business sessions will be held tomorrow and Thursday. Papers and demonstrations by experts will occupy a large part of the sessions.

**Army of the Cumberland.**  
 Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 20.—The annual reunion of the Society of the Army of the Cumberland began in Indianapolis today and will continue through tomorrow. About 300 veterans, including General Wilder, General Boynton and others of note, are in attendance.
