CONTRACT FOR NEW DEPOT.

Horn & Frick Will Build W. & C. R. Station Building for \$2280.

The contract for the W. & C. R. depot was let yesterday afternoon to Horn & Frick, of this place for \$2280, the building to be completed by November 20 for the limit, and as much sooner as possible. Work will be prosecuted immediately and vigorously. The lumber will be on the ground and the actual construction of the building begun Monday next.

Robert Forster has the contract for the milled lumber, and the Oregon Lumber Co. for the plain lumber. Labor and material will all be furnished from Pendleton.

H. P. Rolfe, acting engineer in the absence of Mr. Cutler, who is still critically ill, was over and looked after some of the details, including laying out the ground.

The W. & C. R. owns a 200-foot front on Webb street, between Garden and Willow, besides an L. along Willow, adjacent.

SIXTY-CENT RATE.

First Special Rate Ever Given to Kansas City.

Effective September 24, the O. R. & N. company has published a rate of 60 cents a hundred on grain shipped from points south of Winona for Kansas City. This tariff applies only to carload lots of not less than 20,000 pounds. Heretofore the railroads have never made a special rate on wheat from this section of the country to Kansas City and way points.

Increased demand for the Western grown cereal is the cause of the new tariff. During the present season more wheat has left the Inland Empire for Eastern points than ever before in the history of the wheat growing industry of the Northwest.

Two Loads of Sheep.

Two trainloads of sheep—one train shipped to Garrison & Reynolds and the other by Stephens & Hunter—will be sent from this point in a short time, most of them destined for the Nebraska feeding grounds. It is expected that a proportion of these sheep will be in a condition to slaughter immediately upon their arrival at or near Missouri river points, and in that case those which warrant the step will be immediately forwarded to Chicago and other packing house points.

First Adventist Sermon.

Rev. Daniel Boone, an old man who claims that he in 1869 preached the first Seventh Day Adventist sermon in Pendleton, changed from No. 1 to the northbound train on his way to Colfax, to visit with a daughter who lives on a farm near that place. Mr. Boone was last in Pendleton in 1873, when he came with a tent, a singer and a colporteur and held meetings which continued but a short time on account of extremely inclement weather.

SALOON MEN FIGHT.

Antagonism May Help the Local Option Cause.

Weston, Sept. 21.—Weston's saloonmen are arrayed against each other because of local option, and the climax of a stormy interview yesterday between Herman Hessel, proprietor of the White House, and C. H. Walters, proprietor of the Weston saloon, was a charge of assault against the latter. Hessel is said to have gone to Walters' saloon to discuss local option. Words followed, and the former is alleged to have left the Weston saloon with more rapidity than dignity. Walters was arrested for assault and battery and fined \$7.50.

Hessel is said to be circulating a local option petition among the residents of East Weston and the mountain precincts, where he expects to secure enough support to defeat the measure when it comes before the voters. The anti-saloon men are confident of victory, and have their petitions ready for filing. They look upon the trouble between Hessel and Walters as hopeful to their cause.
