PRUNE CROP LIGHT.

Salem District Will Not Yield Over 50 Per cent of a Full Harvest. "The crop of prunes in the district of Liberty, Sunnyside and Rosedale will exceed a 50 per cent yield," said a gentleman yesterday in conversation with a Salem Statesman reporter, "but the quality will be well up in grade. In fact I do not think we ever had better prunes. Just what they will bring is not known as yet and there are a good many doubting Thomases when one speaks of a good valuation being set on the prunes by the purchaser. Still one that has studied the statistics of the prune situation will no doubt believe there are good reasons for believing that the crop will bring good prices. "One man had a telegram from a Chicago dealer a few days ago asking as to quantity, quality and price, and he is not the first Easterner to interest himself directly with the growers of the luscious fruits, and to try to get in early on the ground floor in the market."
