In Jail for Debt at Spokane. Imprisonment for debt is in full vogue throughout Spokane in this year away from the old debtors' prison days. Three men are now being held in the Spokane county jail for failure to pay debts for board and lodging. Since August 20 there have been six of these offenders, and five of the six have not yet served sentences of from five to 25 days each. Five of the six have been sent to jail from Justice Hinckley's court and one was sentenced from the justice court at Waverly.

The men in jail at present for not paying their just debts are William Hockett, a married man and Spanish speaking, 40 years of age, who was sent up from Waverly to serve out a term of 10 days; L. Younger, a man of 40 and costs; L. and costs, young man, serving 10 and costs, and Louis Baum, serving out a fine of \$10 and costs. The men who have already served their sentences are William Ferguson, sentence \$30 and costs; B. Wilson, sentence \$30 and costs; and Walter Eppinger, sentence \$25 and costs.

Sentence for these offenders means that their time is rated at \$2 per day, that the usual amount from \$4 or \$5 up to \$10, in addition to the fine stipulated. Accordingly, the men sent to jail since August 20 have been confined for from five to 25 days each. —Spokesman-Review.

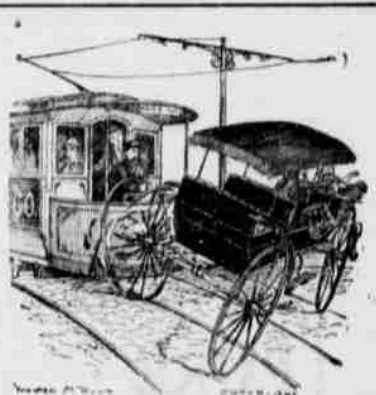
