Long Chase After Thieves. Saturday night, almost a week ago, two young desperadoes, Barker and his partner, who live in the Pocatong area, and who had been caught from stealing grain from the city police and a battle ensued near the depot in Baker City. A dozen shots were exchanged without injury to either side. Deputy Sheriff K. Brown, Deputy Sheriff Snow and a posse the next morning started in pursuit of the robbers, and started out through Haines, and the present moment have not been heard from. Sheriff Brown, who is believed to be now over in the Snake country where it is thought the robbers landed after doubling back their tracks from Haines. Sheriff stated that he would not catch the robbers until he caught them or at least two weeks.—Baker Democrat.

Grain Inspection a Farce. According to D. F. Anderson of Rosalia, one of the members of the state grain commission, little or none of the wheat that is going east from this state is being inspected under the state law. Mr. Anderson estimates that one-half of this year's crop will go east. The reason for this is that no provision has been made for that work. The state has inspectors at Spokane, Seattle and Tacoma. The wheat that is going east comes from a great many towns and shipping points, and the only way in which it could be inspected would be to have inspectors stationed at the state line at the points where the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern pass into Idaho.—Walla Walla Statesman.

Boy is Smooth Swindler. Leroy Graves, the Salt Lake youth who fleeced several of the Walla Walla boys by offering them good positions and securing \$15 deposit from each for the "safe" return of a sample case of jewelry, which was never delivered, has left Walla Walla. Yesterday he secured sufficient money from relatives in Salt Lake to repay the boys that he had received the money from. After he had "squared" up everything he left the city.—Walla Walla Statesman.

Smile to Be Smokeless. Authorities of Seattle have decided to make that a smokeless city January 1, 1905. The board of health unanimously passed a law requiring all factories to smoke consumers under penalty of prosecution for failure to do so. Notices are to be served at every smoke producing plant directing the abolishment of smoke therefrom. An ordinance August 22, 1899, prescribes a fine of more than \$100 or imprisonment for failure to comply with law.—Walla Walla Union.
