FIRST CEMETERY OF GRAND RONDE BEING REMOVED.

Real Estate Company Purchased the Land and Ordered the Dead Removed-New Houses, Fences, Sidewalks and Improvements Being Made-Fifty Unknown Dead Still Remain Unmoved-Cemetery Situated on a Beautiful Knoll That Is a Sightly Residence Location.

The removal of this cemetery recells an incident in the real estate business in Baker City a few years A local real estate dealer sold several lots to eastern people, who had never seen the property, but were satisfied that it was within the corporate limits of Baker City, then called the "Denver of the West."

When the owners came west several years after and hunted up the umbers of their land, it was found that they had been sold lots in a cemtery on the hill overlooking town.

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
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
