## COST OF RUNNING A CAMPAIGN

Corresponding almost identically with the general plan at the democratic headquarters is that of Chairman Cortelyou and his adjutants at republican headquarters. Only one marked difference characterizes the rival headquarters, in that Chairman Cortelyou is only separated from Secretary Louis A. Coolidge by a small reception room, while Chairman Taggart and Secretary Woodson are about as far apart as possible on the allotted space. This is explained by the different methods in force at the respective headquarters in dickering with the army of fakirs and inventors of campaign novelties which is now besieging both camps.

Chairman Cortelyou is making a strenuous effort to meet personally every hawk of campaign novelties who may offer to serve the G. O. P. for a consideration. If the plan seems feasible to the chairman he sends the visitor to Secretary Coolidge to arrange the details or report on them. Chairman Taggart, on the other side, has chosen to have all such visitors referred first to Secretary Woodson, who must pass on them before they reach the throne room. An hour spent with Secretary Woodson or with Chairman Cortelyou will furnish not only ample entertainment to the onlooker, but will reveal vistas of tragedy and comedy unimagined in the workaday world.

A novelty, requiring the outlay of \$500,000, was proposed to the democratic committee by a leading job printer of the United States. His argument was to put a concise democratic argument on millions of trolley car transfer slips, which would be given gratis to the leading street railway systems throughout the United States. The agent submitted statistics, showing that the average street car patron rode several blocks before surrendering his transfer and would be sure to read and mentally digest the tabloid literature printed on its surface. Despite his threat to offer that novelty to the rival committee, Secretary Woodson courteously turned the transfer scheme down with the remark that it was too much of a give-away.

Perhaps the potency of cartoons will have never had such a trial as during this campaign. Up at republican headquarters several cartoonists have been engaged to caricature the enemy, and each cartoon will appear simultaneously in all the leading republican organs of the country. As some 350 of these cartoons will be launched at the enemy, this item alone will approximate \$30,000 or \$35,000.

### EXPECTS SMALL RECEIPTS.

Cattle Raiser Gives Reasons for Light Run of Cattle.

"I notice that there has been some surprise expressed at the yards that did not show a sharp increase as soon as the strike was settled," said a gentleman who is heavily interested both in banking and cattle raising and who desires to have his name withheld for obvious reasons, says the *Drovers' Journal*.

"It is no very great surprise to me, however, and I am of the opinion that receipts of range cattle will be disappointedly small this fall unless there is a very material improvement in prices. What makes me think so?"

"Well, for one thing, I have been in a position for the past three months to learn what cattle men want and what they are getting. When it became apparent several weeks ago that prices were likely to be very low this fall there was a general desire expressed to hold the cattle over to next year, at least a good share of the younger steers.

"Application was made to bankers and commission men to extend loans, and while it was not so easy to have this done early in the season, money has been getting easier right along and during the past several weeks cattle men who had reasonably good security had little difficulty in securing what accommodations they needed.

"You will notice there has been very little complaint from cattle men that they are being crowded for money loaned which is a very unusual circumstance at this time, and especially so in view of the fact that this is a presidential year.

"That is what makes me think there will be no deluge of western range cattle this fall."

### NEW MEXICAN LAMBS HIGH.

Colorado Feeders Will Have to Pay Fancy Prices for Their Lambs.

A recent Colorado lamb feeding proposition this winter P. H. Healand of Las Animas told the *St. Joseph Stockyards Journal* man a few days ago:

"It is not a question of alfalfa with us, for we have a crop that is going a ton and a half to three tons for the three cuttings, and, from all reports, Nebraska and Kansas have good yields of that hay. The price of corn is not worrying us to any extent, for we are confident that we can lay it in at around 75¢ to 78¢ per hundred weight. It is the high price that western flockmasters are asking for their feeders that is giving us no little thought.

"They know well enough that they are the only ones who have the goods this season, and it looks as though if we want the stuff we will have to bid up for it. Several of our feeders have lately been in New Mexico in search for feeding lambs, but they returned empty handed. They say the crop there fell off two-thirds; Colorado's lamb crop dropped down 10 to 15 per cent and the usual number of lambs in the west was not realized.

One of the most expensive items in the campaign, next to the cost of spellbinder oratory, is the printing and stationery bills. For this each campaign committee will this year spend \$500,000. The number and size of the documents sent out have increased with each campaign until it is expected that the Parker and Roosevelt managers will mail no less than 100,000,000 documents of various sorts combined to further the respective candidates. A great many of these are matters of congressional record and are franked, but Uncle Sam will be many thousand dollars richer in his postoffice department when the returns are received in November.

But more than half of the money spent by both national and state committees will reach the pockets of the campaign orators. During the next 10 weeks democratic doctrines will be preached by 5000 political evangelists who will get their cues from national campaign headquarters. As many, if not more, will march forth under the Roosevelt banner. In addition to these 10 full regiments of spellbinders the various state committees of both sides will muster 50,000 more, making a grand army of 60,000 speakers saving the nation on the stump.

Among the captains of democratic oratory who have enlisted to champion the Parker cause are John G. Carlisle, William J. Bryan, Judson Harman, Hoke Smith, Melville E. Ingham, General Patrick A. Collins, Charles A. Hamlin, Senator Joseph W. Bailey, Senator John W. Daniel, W. Bourke Cochran, Charles A. Towne, David B. Hill, Senator E. W. Carmack, John Sharp Williams, Jas. H. Eckels, Senator William J. Stone, Champ Clark, Edward M. Shepard and Carter Harrison.

Some of the more important and best known orators are paid as much as \$250 a week and expenses for their services. Still others donate their time to the cause, while the average cost per head in this means of advertisement is between \$5 and \$100 a week and expenses. Speakers in the employ of the state committees will average less, but some \$5,000,000 will be spent by the national and local committees for oratorical fireworks.

Another item of expense will be the ubiquitous campaign button, of which millions will be distributed by both committees in addition to millions of lithographic portraits, banners and flags, ranging from the abbreviated buttonhole variety to the huge affairs which are big enough to blanket the greatest elephant that ever trumpeted in fact and fable.
