Indians going to the Feast. A band of Indians with their squaws, numbering about 100, passed through Spokane this morning en route to Nespelem to attend the funeral of the late Chief Joseph. They were seated upon their kayuses with great bundles of provisions in front and behind them. It is said that they have taken enough food to last for months.

Their countenances all bore signs of sorrow and their love and faithful devotion to their chief is emphasized by the fact that they are making the trip in this manner. The celebration of the funeral will be the duration. Great bonfires will be held every night which will provide for the roasting of whole beaver and other animals brought by the natives. There will be a war dance which will be headed by the chief Joseph's head. The next chief will probably be chosen from George Moses, Joe Koutek and John Wilson of Nez Perce reservation.

Word has been sent to all tribes and those from the Yakima district are gathering slowly. Joseph was buried Thursday afternoon in a box 100 yards northwest of Nespelem. The natives are lamenting the destruction of their tribes. The march of braves around the temporary grave is the only service at this time. Tribes are arriving day and night to participate in the celebration. About 6000 Indians are expected to be present.—Spokane Press.
