PORTLAND FLOUR IS STILL GOING EAST. Shipments continue to go East with prospect of greater amounts to be sent later on—Oregon Hops sell at 30 Cents Per Pound.

Portland, Oct. 5.—Some small lots of Portland flour are still being sold for Eastern account, but there is greater difficulty in securing a sufficient number of cars. The same condition exists in wheat and buyers are holding off until they are assured that the stock can be delivered within the next month or so.

Hops at 30 Cents. It now transpires that several more sales of hops were made up the valley Saturday at 30c. They were bought by Walter Toomey and were as follows: Joseph Aicher, 92 bales at 30c; Chris Zimmerman, of Aurora, 40 bales at 30c; John Addelman, 55 bales at 30c; Nick Serres, 20 bales at 30c; P. J. Hansen, 129 bales at 29 1/2c.
