

SEATTLE READY FOR LAUNCHING

BATTLESHIP NEBRASKA TO SLIP INTO THE SOUND.

Governor Mickey, of Nebraska, and Party to Arrive in Seattle Today—Miss Mickey Will Christen the Vessel—Cost of the Big Fighter Was \$3,733,000—Displacement of 14,994 Tons.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 6.—All arrangements have been completed at the Moran Bros.' shipyards for the launching tomorrow of the big battleship Nebraska. Miss Mary Nain Mickey, daughter of Governor Mickey of Nebraska, will break the bottle of champagne over the bows of the vessel. In addition to Governor Mickey and the other members of the party from Nebraska, the launching will be attended by many distinguished army and navy officials.

The first-class battleship Nebraska is one of five vessels of the same type and general dimensions soon to be added to the United States navy. The other four are the Virginia and the Rhode Island, which have already been launched, the Georgia, which is to take to the water within the coming week, and the New Jersey.

The keel of the Nebraska was laid in July, 1902, and four months later actual construction of the vessel began. She is now about 70 per cent completed and it is expected to have her ready to be turned over to the government within another year. The contract price is \$3,733,000. She will have a displacement of 14,994 tons and is designed to have a speed of 19 knots. Her main battery will consist of four 12-inch breech-loading rifles, eight 8-inch breech-loading rifles and 12 6-inch rapid-fire guns. The secondary battery will consist of 12 3-inch rapid-fire guns, 12 3-pounder rapid-fire guns, eight 1-pounder rapid-fire guns, two 3-inch field guns, two machine guns and six automatic guns.

NEGROES ARE MISTREATED.

Americans in Pretoria Claim They Are Grossly Abused.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—The state department has received from Joseph E. Proffit, United States consul at Pretoria, a petition from 12 American negroes who appeal for their treaty rights, and claim the liberties which they enjoyed under the late Boer government, but which have been abrogated on account of their color.

They are debarred from riding in second-class carriages on the railways and from walking on the sidewalks, from which they are thrown like chattels. They are not permitted to start in business, and are told that they must accept the same treatment as the natives.

They declare that "this and more makes our position unbearable." The consul comments on the petition to the effect that the statements contained in it are substantially correct, not because the petitioners are American citizens, but because it is the custom to treat all natives in the same fashion, no negroes are treated in the Southern states of America.

German-Americans Celebrate.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 6.—German-Americans of St. Louis and vicinity turned out in large numbers for the celebration of the World-fair of the anniversary of the first landing of their forefathers in America. The program included a parade, gymnastic and athletic exercises of two military and 2000 active Germans. Formal exercises were held at the German House, the distinguished participants including Carl Becking, ex-secretary of the Interior, Consul-General Theodore Lewald, Imperial World-fair commissioner, Congressman Berthold, Professor Heller of Washington university, and others.

Cannon in Wisconsin.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 6.—Beginning today the national republican committee with the co-operation of the state central committee has arranged to turn some of its most distinguished stump speakers loose in Wisconsin. Speaker Cannon, with Congressman Bede of Minnesota, is scheduled for a speech at Appleton tonight. The two will also spend tomorrow in the Badger state, being slated to appear at Green Bay in the afternoon and at Marinette in the evening.
