**FOUND HOT ROCK**

**OX BOW TUNNEL REVEALS CURIOUS PHENOMENA.**

At a Depth of 900 Feet a Strata of Extremely Hot Rock and Water Was Struck and After Passing Through This, a Normal Temperature Was Found—Tunnel Will Open Large Gravel Bars in Which Gold is Said to Exist in Large Quantities.

The Boise Capital News, speaking of the work on the Ox Bow tunnel, in Idaho, tells of a curious phenomenon found in running the tunnel.

When about 900 feet in on the tunnel a strata of hot rock was encountered, of which the Capital News says:

"They recently struck a big flow of very hot water, in the east end of the tunnel, which bothered considerably. After going through a hot granite dyke, the rock became cooler for some distance, but he said they are now working in very hot stone again."

"The men could not stand it only for the fact that the air compressor forces a cool current of air against the hot face of the tunnel, which carries the heated air out and makes a degree of temperature that is bearable, though it could not by any stretch of the imagination be called cool."

"Mr. Coate said about 500 feet of tunnel is now completed and there is about 270 feet yet to drive with two machine drills working at either end, he thought the big hole, 10 feet high by 20 feet in width, would be blasted out in four or five weeks at the most. After this is done a dam about 10 feet high will be put in the river, with a headgate for high water."

"Supplies, Mr. Coate said, are now being hauled in sufficient to last a large force all winter, as it is the intention to proceed with the placer work as soon as possible, and on account of having several hundred inches of hot water, winter weather will not interfere with the operations."

"To give an idea of how hot the formation is, Mr. Coate said, he rolled up his sleeve, and reaching down through a foot of cold water in the river, he grabbed down a few inches into the sand, and found it so hot he could not hold it in his hand any length of time. Several springs are found in that vicinity, he said, in which the water is at boiling temperature."

"Mr. Coate is confident of securing big returns from working the gravel in the old channel of the river, which for a distance of nearly three miles will be drained dry by the tunnel. He said they had received so many applications for electric power, that it was the intention of his company to put in dynamos and develop

several thousand horse power; early next season.

"He was certain the power plant would be a profitable investment from the start and later on as the country improved, he thought larger demand would be made, which might enable the company to utilize all the power they could generate."

In spite of the many dwelling houses built and put in habitable shape by repairs, every possible shelter is filled to its utmost fullness. Two old church buildings have each been transformed into two dwelling houses, and the four resultant places shelter four families. A bigger and better Corvallis is to be a feature of the future.—Corvallis Times.
