STILLMAN SAYS QUIET CAMPAIGN

MOST LIFELESS OF ALL
PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS.

Business Not Affected by Election—All Classes of People Seem to Be Optimistic—World's Fair is a Monster Concern, Which Needs to Be Studied to Be Appreciated—Lawyers' Congress at St. Louis Was a Magnificent Array of Legal Talent.

A. D. Stillman, delegate from Oregon to the National Bar Association and the National Fraternities Congress, just held in St. Louis, has returned and is highly pleased with the result of his visit.

In speaking of his interesting trip Mr. Stillman said:

"I saw nothing except Colorado, Kansas City and St. Louis. There is a great deal of dullness in Colorado, owing to the labor difficulties that have been there during the last year. But outside of that influence and some shortage of the wheat crops in some sections, I think that the business outlook is good."

"So far as I was able to learn of them, the business spirit is active. Men are going ahead with improvements and investments as they would with full faith in continued good times, and so far as I know that was representative of the spirit in all parts of the country."

Quiet Campaign.—"I couldn't see that the presidential election was cutting any particular figure anywhere. There was no excitement and no particular interest being taken in it. I never saw a time when so little attention was being paid everywhere to a presidential election."

"I think that the people are generally in an optimistic frame of mind, and feel that no matter what the result of the presidential election is, that the election will not produce any great change."

"The over-capitalization of corporations and the big stock ventures like U. S. steel and the shipbuilding trust do not affect general business conditions throughout the country, because those stocks were largely taken by a class that had a surplus capital, and were not, in my judgment, purchased to any considerable extent by business men or men who are engaged in active business operations; consequently, if the most of the people who purchased that class of stock went out of business entirely, the country would not feel it and would probably not suffer any loss."

No Labor Disturbances.—"So far as I could observe, at Kansas City perfect harmony prevails in labor circles. The recent strike there has, so far as I could see, left no great sting behind. The packing houses in Kansas City were in operation, and the employees were evidently satisfied. Of course, we must remember that the strike in Kansas City was a sympathetic strike and did not grow out of actual grievances that existed at that point."

Politics Don't Affect Business.—"I do not think that national politics are at this time having, or will have, any depressing effect on business conditions. The great, plain people will be pretty well satisfied with the election of Roosevelt, and the big moneyed interests, in whose hands probably the power to create a panic exists, will be perfectly well satisfied with the election of Parker."

"The moneyed, or trust class, if I may use the term, having enjoyed a degree of prosperity under three years of the reign of Roosevelt, is not going to be in any manner alarmed by his re-election. So I see nothing in the election of either Parker or Roosevelt to disturb business conditions."

The Fair a Big Concern.

"The St. Louis fair proper is magnificent in its proportions, and it is scarcely possible to conceive of the immensity of the collection that has been brought under the roofs of the buildings covering the exhibits of agriculture, machinery, manufactures, transportation and varied industries, mining, metallurgy and art."

"I made no effort to examine any exhibit in detail. The most attractive feature of the fair, and the one that in a spectacular way will leave the most lasting impression upon my mind, is what is called the Grand Court, the basin and lagoon between the palace of varied industries and the manufactures building, with the wonderful, magnificent fountain at the west."

"This, either under the light of day or illuminated in colors as it is at night, must leave a lasting impression upon the mind of everyone who sees it. The pictures that appear in the magazines, show somewhat of the detail, but are wholly inadequate to convey an idea of its gigantic proportions."

Meeting of the Lawyers.

"Judge Bean of the Oregon supreme court, and C. J. Schnable, of the Portland bar, I met at the banquet given by the exposition to the American Bar Association and the International Congress of Lawyers and Jurists."

"The banquet that I referred to is one that will be long remembered by those who were fortunate enough to be present. It was presided over by Governor Francis, and on his right sat Judge Brewer of the supreme court of the United States; and next to him was Lord Kennedy, of the court of England that corresponds with our United States supreme court. "On the bench were distinguished judges and jurists from most of the great countries of the world, and toasts were responded to by lawyers

from Italy, Germany, France and other countries, and finally a jurist of the supreme court of Egypt, who is an American, educated in Chicago.

"The supreme court of Egypt is one of the most unique and interesting on earth. Each of the great powers have a representative there—French, German, English and American, and it follows the procedure of the code of Napoleon."

Fraternities Congress.

"A very full representation was present from all the fraternities having membership in the Fraternities Congress. The membership represented was something over 7,000,000. I think the only Oregon people present were Mrs. Van Orsdall, Professor Hawley of the Willamette university, Mrs. Hawkins of Toledo, and myself."

"I read one of the four papers that were presented to the law section of the Fraternities Congress, and will be a member of the committee on laws and revisions of the National Fraternities Congress. I do not know that any other member of the congress from Oregon will be a member of the permanent committees."

"There are only three officers of the National Fraternities Congress proper. Of these, the head consul of the Woodmen of the World, F. A. Falkenburg, is president; A. R. Talbot, head of the Modern Woodmen of America, is vice-president, and A. R. Sackett, supreme recorder of the A. O. U. W., is secretary-treasurer."

Poor Statue Unveiled.

Hackensack, N. J., Oct. 7.—A heroic bronze statue of Gen. Enoch Poor, a soldier of the American revolution, was unveiled here today with interesting ceremonies and in the presence of representatives of patriotic organizations in various parts of New Jersey. The statue was erected by the New Jersey chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution. It represents the soldiers with cocked hat, regimentals, epaulettes and high-spurred boots, standing with a bared sword, the point on the ground between his feet. The statue was designed by Emilio Platti.

Sunday Rest Congress.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 7.—The International Sunday Rest Congress will convene in this city for three days of next week. Addresses will be delivered by Bishop Samuel W. Fallows of Chicago, Rev. Dr. J. William Jones, chaplain general of the Confederate veterans; George E. McNeill, the Boston labor leader, and others. Papers on every phase of the Sunday rest question will be read, including several by Samuel Gompers, Dr. Wilbur F. Crafts and Bishop J. P. Fitzgerald.

Mrs. Fairbanks Speaks.

Olean, N. Y., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Charles Fairbanks, wife of the republican vice-presidential candidate, was the principal speaker here today at the exercises held in connection with the dedication of a beautiful boulder monument to the memory of Adam Hoops and other revolutionary soldiers of Cattaraugus county. The monument was erected by the Daughters of the Revolution.
