Market continues to strengthen with light receipts—Cattle and Hogs continue dull—Grain-fed Lambs are quoted at from \$2.25 to \$2.75—No Cattle Now Going to Market—Portland—Hops Reach 3 1/2 cents.

Market Reaches 3 1/2 Cents.

Portland, Oct. 7.—The sheep market continues to strengthen its tone as the cattle and hogs are dull and the receipts today consisted of 27 hogs, 25 cattle and 226 sheep. Official ruling prices today are: 100 lbs.—Best Eastern Oregon steers, \$3.00; best valley steers, \$2.75; lam steers, \$2.50; cows, \$2; bulls, \$1.50; stags, \$2.

Market Reaches 3 1/2 Cents.

Portland, Oct. 7.—Late yesterday noon Seavey & Metzler, of this city, paid the highest price of the season for hops, 3 1/2 cents per pound. The purchase consisted of 100 bales of hops. The same firm also purchased 260 bales from other parties at 3 1/2 cents. Quite a number of sales reported at 2 1/2 cents for primes to 2 1/2 cents. There are plenty of buyers willing to sell at the latter price, says McKinley Mitchell. Mr. Mitchell bought 150 bales at the prices.

Prices of Cascara Bark.

Chittim bark, peeled this summer from Alsea trees, is now on its way to London, England. There is a car of it, and it is the fourth in the shipments of a big pool of bark recently purchased in Alsea by J. E. Henkle of Philomath. The other three cars went to New York and Philadelphia. A fifth car of the bark by the Alsea peeler can be completed. It will clean up the Henkle pool, and incidentally, it and the other pool sold last week, nearly cleans up the peeled bark stock of the Alsea valley, which is chittim headquarters. The Henkle pool brought \$5.30 per 100 pounds. The pool last week went at an average of \$5.11, 10 tons having sold at \$5.31, and 32 tons at \$5.05.—Corvallis Times.
