### GENERAL NEWS.

Lady Besant, widow of Sir Walter Besant, died at Manaton, England, Saturday night.

Continued rains in New Mexico have swollen all the streams and traffic is delayed again.

Andrew Carnegie has set aside \$200,000 for one central and four branch libraries in London.

A big scandal in connection with the government transport service is threatened by investigation at San Francisco.

Mike McAuliffe, once champion middleweight pugilist of the United States, died Sunday at New York, of heart failure.

In Moscow 7500 needy Poles are working at making army uniforms, turning out 100,000 winter uniforms per month.

The Metropolitan Street Railway Company, of New York City, has just received \$550 from a woman who said she won a suit for damages against the company by false swearing.

Judge Ben Lindsay, of Denver, was nominated for re-election as county judge by the republicans, Saturday. Judge Lindsay is a democrat, but has a national reputation as a juvenile court reformer.

In the peace congress in Boston, Saturday, the Russian and Japanese representatives advanced to the front of the stage and shook hands, long and vigorously, amid the loudest applause of the congress.

The agricultural department has set aside \$25,000 for experiments in breeding American carriage horses, with good trotting grades as a foundation. The experiments will be carried on at Fort Collins, Col.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

The report of the disastrous coal fire in Marshfield mines proves to be untrue.

Ernest Thorsen, of La Grande, was fined \$50 and his license revoked, for selling liquor to minors.

J. M. Rumbaugh, a prosperous Salem farmer and pruner, committed suicide Saturday by drowning himself.

A prohibition vote will be taken in Klamath county, a petition with 14 excess names having been filed Saturday.

The Great Falls Tribune has been sold by Senator W. A. Clark to W. G. Conrad and W. G. Eggleston, of Helena, for \$75,000.

Trappist Monks have bought 185 acres of land in Linn county for \$3350. They will found a colony for refugees banished from France.

Within the past week two men have been murdered in Butte by "knockout drops." One of them, Edward Wegner, was robbed of \$300.

The bank clearances of Portland for the week ending October 8, were \$5,249,000, or 25 per cent greater than for the corresponding week in 1903.

The O. W. P. company, of Portland, will expend \$100,000 in fitting up resort at the end of its tracks, similar to Coney Island, N. Y., as a means of stimulating Sunday excursions.

Two hoboes, E. S. Cox and H. J. Banning, who burglarized the O. R. & N. section house at Winona, Wash., Saturday, were caught, tried and sentenced to one year each in the penitentiary in less than 24 hours.

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### DEMOCRATS TO START BAIL ROLLING OCTOBER 15.

Candidate for Presidential Election on the Democratic Ticket Will begin the Task of Reducing the Monster Republican Majority of June—From October 15 to November 8, Democratic Speakers Will Keep the Work Going.

Oregon's state central committee of the democratic party will marshal its forces and strike its first blow October 15. Workers will be sent throughout the state and for three weeks the hills and dales of Oregon will resound with chants for Parker and Davis, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

The candidates for presidential electors will take to the stump. W. B. Dillard will go into Eastern Oregon, T. H. Crawford to Southern Oregon and J. A. Jeffrey to Central and Middle Oregon and Astoria and the Columbia river district. Many others will go into the field and local campaigners will work in every county.

Alex Sweek, chairman of the state central committee, will forsake his private office next Monday and will be found with a large corps of assistants at the democratic headquarters in the Scott hotel directing the campaign. He is in constant communication with the democratic forces of the East. Yesterday a letter from the national headquarters stated that a speaker of national reputation will be sent to Oregon to assist in conducting the campaign. William J. Bryan was asked to come, but he is in greater demand than any other speaker and is kept busy in Indiana, West Virginia and New York. In all probability the speaker will be Senator Bailey, of Texas, whose fiery tongue has electrified the members of the United States senate in many debates.

Reports from national headquarters yesterday were to the effect that New York, West Virginia and Indiana are considered democratic. The party is now making a hard fight in New Jersey and Connecticut. The advices also state that Illinois and Wisconsin are good fighting ground and that Montana, Colorado and Nevada are conceded to the democrats. They hope also to carry Utah.

There will be a grand rally in this part of the county to be held during the latter part of the campaign. The Multnomah Club has taken the initiative and has appointed a committee to confer with the campaign committee of other democratic clubs in this city for the purpose of making definite arrangements for the proposed meeting. This committee consists of Alex Sweek, Joseph Malley and John Lament.

### WARD AND KIDDER TONIGHT.

"Salamambo" to Come to the Frazer Theater This Evening.

"Salamambo," in which Frederick Warde and Kathryn Kidder will appear this evening is a spectacular romantic tragedy written by Stanislaus Stange, and based on Flaubert's great novel of that name.
