GENERAL NEWS.

The German steamer China, hit a mine off Vladivostok and sunk, Monday.

Grover Cleveland will make several campaign speeches in the East, during October.

Fourteen persons were injured in a Santa Fe collision in the Kansas City yards, Monday.

Russia has granted special rates on tickets for Jews wishing to emigrate anywhere out of Europe.

Catholics have been strictly forbidden by the pope to participate in political campaigns in America.

The Rock Island, Santa Fe and Southern Pacific are all still crippled by floods in Texas and New Mexico.

Peter Koroloshol and Chris Martell, Greeks, blew out the gas in a Chicago hotel Monday. When found they were dead.

The ceremony of anointing King Peter of Serbia, took place Sunday during which the 30-pound crown was held by attendants.

W. A. Clark, Jr., son of the Montana senator, has paid \$10,000 for Bon Voyage, winner of the \$5000 Futurity purse at Lexington.

Over 70,000 Imperial troops of Italy are now under orders to quell any riots that may occur at Italian elections to take place this week.

Three valuable horses were burned in a barn at Forest Grove, Monday morning.

THE FAIR IS OPEN

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT WALLA WALLA RACES.

Stables All Filled With Fast Horses, and the Program is Being Carried Out Smoothly—Much Larger Crowd Attended the Opening Than Was Present Last Year.

The second annual race meeting and stock show of the Walla Walla County Fair association, is now open under the best of conditions.

While the weather was not up to what had been ordered by Secretary Caswell, it did not have any effect in keeping the people away from the grounds, says the Walla Walla Statesman, of Monday evening. Early yesterday afternoon the people began going to the track and when the first race was called at 1:30 there was a larger attendance by several hundred than on the opening day of last year.

All the racing stables were filled with horses that will take part in the program for the week and a considerable amount of the fancy and blooded stock had been placed in the pens. Secretary Caswell and the other directors were busily engaged in arranging the minor details and looking after the wants of the horsemen and the comfort of the spectators.

The indications are very favorable for a week of good sport and the attendance will undoubtedly be greater than ever.

Robert Leighton, secretary of the North Pacific circuit, is the presiding judge and he is being ably assisted by Frank E. Smith and H. E. Woods. In addition to acting as judge, Mr. Woods will be the official starter of all races during the week.

The way that he handled the jockeys was excellent and the patrons of the fair are assured that there will be no delays in pulling off each event on time during the week.

"SALAMMBO" WAS GOOD.

Warde and Kidder Sustain Their En- vialable Reputations in Pendleton.

The play "Salammbô," in its itself a very clever rendition of the Flaubert story, Stanislaus Strange has proved his ability as a writer of melodrama, by the manner in which he has handled this production. Frederick Warde and Miss Kathryn Kidder in "Salammbô" at the Frazer last night, portrayed the difficult roles assigned them in the pleasing manner that has for many seasons kept their names at the head of their profession.

With Warde and Kidder in the presentation of "Salammbô" there is an exceptionally strong cast. Thomas Cooke, as Spondius, the Greek slave; Wadsworth Harris, as Hamlicar, commander in chief of the Carthaginian army; and Dudley Keliher, as Narr Hays, king of Numidia, are actors all capable of giving Miss Kidder and Mr. Warde the support necessary in the rendition of the play.

The Frazer was crowded last night and the performance was received with enthusiasm. At the close of the third act, in which is portrayed the great scene between the barbarian chieftain and Salammbô in the tent of Matho, there were repeated curtain calls.

TYPEWRITING IN PUBLIC SCHOOL.

Lewiston Teaches Useful Business Branches in High School.

The Lewiston Tribune, speaking of the progress of the public schools there, says:

The registration in the high school is increasing rapidly, being considerably above 100 and new students entering almost daily. The work in this department is progressing splendidly, there being now about all that can be accommodated. Three new typewriters have been added this term, making five machines in constant use and the demand is so great that another machine may have to be added soon.

There are now about 25 students in typewriting alone, and they are trained in touch typewriting on both Remington and Smith-Premier machines, thus giving them a better office equipment than if they learned but one keyboard. In stenography some students are now writing from 100 to 125 words a minute, which is as high as is required in almost any business college.

Missouri Day at Big Fair.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 11.—It looked as though a new attendance record would be established at the World's fair today so large were the crowds that were present to help in the celebration of Missouri Day. The low railroad rates brought thousands of visitors from every nook and corner of the state and the rush appeared to equal if not surpass the crowds of St. Louis Day. Governor Dockery and nearly all of the other prominent state officials were in attendance and took part in the formal exercises.
