CROKER'S RETURN

TAMMANY'S OLD CHIEF BACK IN THE HAUNTS.

His Coming Received With Almost Indifference—Not Known Whether He Has Any Intention of Trying to Resume Control of the Machine, or Whether He Can If He Tries—Many Believe That He Has Relinquished All American Ambition.

New York, Oct. 11.—How true after all is the old saying "Out of sight, out of mind." It is difficult for those who remember the illimitable power in New York city wielded by Richard Croker a very few years ago to realize the almost utter indifference with which he has been received the news that he is coming back to New York shortly after the election. Ever since Mr. Croker abdicated as chief of the Tammany society gossip has been rife that he would return to New York and resume control of the organization. When he retired there was general skepticism that he was sincere in his stated intention to abandon politics for good, but as the repeated rumors of his intended return failed successively of fulfillment the leaders of Tammany, who chafed under his iron control, have gained courage to scoff at the old boss without fear of being lashed for their disloyalty.

Leaders of all parties and politicians are now convinced that Mr. Croker has no intention of taking command of the Wigwam, and the authoritative announcement from former Mayor VanWyck, who is one of the ex-chief's closest friends, that Mr. Croker will visit New York caused hardly a ripple of interest even in Tammany circles. In the language of the Wigwam, Mr. Croker is a "has been" in politics, and it is considered extremely doubtful that he could gain control of Tammany again, even

NEW YORK HAIR TRADE.

Gray Hair is Worth Its Weight in Silver or Gold.

New York, Oct. 11.—The largest dealers in human hair in New York, who practically supply the hair crop for the entire country, are authority for the statement that the demand for this commodity was never as great as it is at present. The result is that the price of all shades and styles of human hair is rapidly soaring upward.

There has been an advance in the price of first-class hair from 20 to 50 per cent within the last three months. The present indications are, judging from the size of the crop being imported, that there will be a still further advance in prices during the winter months. One dealer said this week that it is almost impossible to supply the demand for first-class hair. A wig of gray human hair of fine quality is worth its weight in silver, or perhaps even in gold.

Question of Druggists' Rights.

New York, Oct. 11.—New York druggists are saying unkind things about a local magistrate who decided that a Third avenue pharmacist had no right to charge for his trouble in arising from his bed in the middle of the night and supplying a customer with 5 cents worth of mustard and the use of the telephone pay station. It is argued that if physicians charge higher rate for after-bedtime service druggists should have the same right.
