GENERAL NEWS.

Fifty extra policemen have been drafted in Chicago to stop auto scorching.

Mrs. Alfred Wilkie, wife of the well known Boston tenor, is dead in Oakland, Cal.

Thomas E. Watson's headquarters are at the Hoffman House, New York City, with Melville E. Pallister in charge.

General Stoessel has sent word to St. Petersburg that unless he gets help he must surrender Port Arthur by December 1.

The heaviest rain of the season is now falling at Liao Yang and Mukden, making artillery movements almost impossible.

Mrs. John Angell, who claimed to be a widow of the late Jay Gould, and who sued the estate for a share, is dead at New York City.

The employers' Association has decided to stand by the coal operators in their present strike in Pennsylvania and will raise \$100,000 to fight the strikers if necessary.

The annual report of the judge advocate general of the United States shows a great decrease in the amount of disorder and the consequent number of troops in the army.

Armour has refused to testify as to the practice of discriminating against small shippers in the refrigerator car investigation, before the interstate commerce commission.

It is said a secret agreement between the czar and Kaiser has just been made, by which Russia may withdraw troops across German territory from frontier posts in Poland to be sent at once to the Orient.

The republicans and socialists of Italy have united in the present campaign. The elections will be held October 30 and November 9, when a large number of socialists is expected to be chosen to the chamber of deputies.

RIVER STEAMER IS FAST.

Mountain Gem Shows Admirable Speed Against Strong Current of Snake.

The steamer Mountain Gem returned early yesterday afternoon from a trip to Ten Mile, where a cargo of 1400 sacks of wheat was received and brought to Lewiston for shipment to the eastern market over the Northern Pacific.

The steamer made the run to Astoria in one minute less than an hour and reached Ten Mile in one hour and 35 minutes after leaving Lewiston. This includes the stop made at Astoria which gives the steamer an average speed of eight miles an hour against the current of the upper Snake River.

The Ten Mile landing is located 13 miles from Lewiston and several stiff rapids are located between the two points.

The steamer Lewiston went to Astoria yesterday and received 1200 sacks of wheat from the Vollmer-Clearwater company for shipment to New York.

The Norma is making regular trips to upper river points for wheat, and the steamers Spokane and Lewiston, aside from taking out cargoes of wheat from river points each trip are maintaining a regular daily passenger and freight service between Lewiston and Riparia. In fact, there are now all kinds of boats on the river.
