GENERAL NEWS.

Burglars cracked the Stonington, Conn., city vaults and got away with \$19,000.

The Greek steamer Elpis, with 77 persons aboard, foundered and sunk in the Black Sea.

There are now 675,000 volumes in the Harvard University libraries, of which 22,000 were placed during the last year.

The German standing army is to be raised to 621,000 men, and the Kaiser asks for \$59,000,000 to enlarge the navy.

George Miles, at Tarrytown, N. Y., while playing football, had his right ear completely torn off, close to the head by the kick of another player.

The Haines Mercantile Company has founded a private bank, the people of that place being depending upon Baker City for banking facilities.

John Schauf, a Spokane laborer, was run over November 29 by a stunted box car in the Northern Pacific yards, and received fatal injuries.

The 39 labor unions in the building trades of New York City, will form a new central organization next Sunday. It is believed a great strike is brewing.

It is not possible for Henrik Ibsen, the author and dramatist, to long survive the attacks of heart failure to which he is subject. He lies very ill at Stockholm, Sweden.

Counting the secret service men, city detectives, special police and trackwalkers, 2000 men comprised Roosevelt's personal guard on his trip to the World's Fair.

Harry Mills, inventor of fulminate of mercury caps, was blown to atoms literally, at St. Louis, November 25, together with the small isolated building in which he worked. The cause of the disaster is unknown.

Mrs. Elsie M. Pugh, aged 21 years, was recently divorced in the Oakland, Cal., courts, for the third time.

The penitentiary at Salem has 344 inmates, which is more than the institution has had before in many years.

County Treasurer Elkins, of Crook county, is dead at Prineville, of brain fever. He had lived in Crook county 24 years.

The O. R. & N. is being extended from Boise five miles to the Barber Lumber company's plant, on the river above town.

In a fiercely and skillfully contested game of football, the Seattle high school team beat the Lewiston high school team at Lewiston, November 28, by 5 to 0.

Two million pounds of next year's Wyoming wool clip have been contracted for at 17 1/2 cents per pound. Many flockmasters are holding for higher prices.

The Seattle-Tacoma Power company threatens to put in an electric lighting plant at Seattle in competition with the Seattle Electric company and reduce rates for light.

Mrs. Susie Rumboux, of Walsh Lake, Wash., has been convicted of manslaughter for causing the death of her husband, and sentenced to the penitentiary for two and a half years.

The Idaho state canvassing board met at Boise November 28, only to find that the returns from Kootenai county had not yet arrived. The board will adjourn from day to day until they arrive.

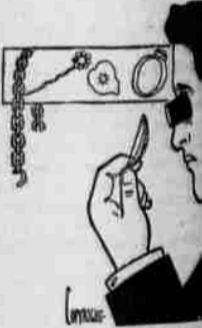
