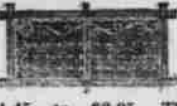

### GENERAL NEWS.

W. E. Frost, president of Westford academy, Lowell, Mass., fell dead while teaching a class, at the age of 42.

James W. Hendricks, who had never been ill a day in his life, nor recruited a physician, dropped dead on the street in Louisville, Ky., aged 38 years.

Senator Stewart admits that Nevada will this winter elect a straight republican to succeed him in the senate, and expresses the belief that it will be George S. Dixon.

By the blunder of a brakeman at Hammond, Mont., conductor Zierbel and brakeman Chesbrough were caught between two cars on a round house track and killed.

The generally forgotten fact that General Nelson A. Miles is a democrat brought to mind by Governor-elect Douglas, of Massachusetts, offering to appoint Miles adjutant general of that state.

During the last eight months 42 hunters have been accidentally shot and killed by other hunters in Wisconsin and the Michigan peninsula. Nineteen others were wounded. A law is being agitated for both states making killing on the game range, no matter how accidental it may be, homicide.

E. S. McClure, proprietor and editor of McClure's Magazine, has made a compilation showing that the Boer war cost 22,600 British lives, and that during the past three years there have been 31,395 murders in the United States, and 21,847 persons killed on the railroads in the United States during the same period.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

There is no hope for the recovery of Patrick McDonald, of The Dalles, whose leg was amputated as the result of a railway accident a short time ago.

The output of the La Grande sugar factory was 60 per cent larger this year than last, while it is probable that its capacity will be doubled in time for next year's crop of beets.

Friends of 20 dead Chinamen at Seattle have secured a permit to examine the bodies for the purpose of sending them to China: a performance that religion and custom inexorably demands.

Four thousand Malheur, Grant and Baker county cattle are being driven through to Winnemucca, Nevada, by the Pacific Livestock company, which will ship them from that point to their feeding yards in California.

A general round-up of hoboes was effected in Arlington, December 2, about 100 were rounded up and started out of town. Everyone not having a visible means of support was classed among them and started on the "hike."

Louis Rath and Charles Eberhart at Redding, Cal., fought a duel, one armed with a dirk, the other with a stick of stove-wood. Eberhart, who wielded the club, will die. Rath has been arrested. A Spanish woman was the source of the trouble.

On account of an order received from headquarters shortening the hours of work from 10 to eight a day and making a proportionate cut in wages, 250 men employed in the steel gangs laying new 40-pound rails on the Southern Pacific line on the mountain division between Grant's Pass and Cow Creek Canyon, have struck. It is more of a walk-out than a strike, as the men simply laid down their tools and refused to work on the eight-hour schedule.

## NAVY NEEDS MEN

### ENLISTMENTS SOUGHT BY THE GOVERNMENT.

Large Number of New Battleships Has Increased Demand for Men—Recruiting Officer to Be in Walla Walla on December 16—Only Young Men Wanted—Pay Ranges From \$18 to \$60 Per Month.

Walla Walla, Dec. 5.—On Friday, December 16, Uncle Sam's recruiting officer will be here to enlist men for the navy. The large number of new war vessels just being completed has caused a great dearth of men in all lines. Large posters, posted conspicuously about the city, tell of the different kinds of men wanted and the salaries which the government will pay.

As on land, skill in a particular line counts. For instance, an ordinary landsman, with nothing but his willing hands and strong body, can get only \$18 a month for his services, while a boiler-maker, for instance, gets \$65 and a coppersmith \$52 for the same time. A good seaman receives \$24. Machinists are also wanted badly. In this department service begins at \$40 a month and promotion is possible to \$1800 a year for head men.

Rations are furnished free in addition to wages and besides this free medicines and free medical attendance. Young men only are wanted, the age limits are from 15 years to 25 years.

Another class of men wanted is clerical men. These are called yeomen. They must be able to write a legible hand and use a typewriter. They get \$30 a month. If in addition to these qualifications they are stenographers, they are classed as second-class yeomen and get \$35 per month with a chance of promotion to chief yeomen at \$60.

The recruiting officer is now in Salem, Or. He will arrive on December 16, and will stay here four days.

Seamen's Convention. San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 5.—The International Seamen's Union of America began its ninth annual convention in San Francisco today. Delegates are present from the Atlantic coast, the Great Lakes, the Gulf and the Pacific coast. The principal matter to come up for consideration is the proposition to consolidate with the longshoremen, with a view of eventually making one union of all marine employes.

Convention of Miners. San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 5.—The California Miners' Association, representing a membership of nearly 8000 miners, began its thirteenth annual convention in this city today and will remain in session until Friday. The business sessions are to be devoted to papers and addresses on mining and kindred topics. Excursions and other forms of entertainment will occupy the afternoons and evenings.

Bill Posters in Session. Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 5.—The annual convention of the National Alliance of Bill Posters and Billers of America opened here today. There was a large attendance of delegates from the principal cities of this country and Canada. A number of questions of importance, affecting theatrical people and other advertisers using billboards, will come up for consideration.

New Bank at Prairie City. M. A. Butler of Portland, passed through on the forenoon train, bound for Prairie City, where he goes to participate in a meeting to be held tomorrow for the purpose of organizing a bank. He says the furniture, stationery and supplies have been purchased and the institution will open for business about the 15th inst. He knows nothing about the Canyon City bank putting in a branch at Prairie City, except what he saw in the Miner, a report to that effect.—Sumpter Daily Miner.

Bend Soon to Be a Town. County court held an extra session last Saturday to act upon the petition of the Bend residents for the incorporation of their town. The application was presented by A. L. Goodwillie and G. C. Steineman and the court ordered that an election be held within the district on December 12.—Crook County Journal.
