## LARRY O'NEIL WAS HANGED.

Died Game and Said He Was Glad to Go.

San Quentin, Jan. 6.—Larry O'Neil, alias Henry Milton, was hanged at 10:30 this morning.

He died game and chatted with the warden before going to the scaffold. He was glad to die, as he said he was a bad man all his life and wanted to see what the other world looked like. He had a glass of whiskey and asked for a cigarette, which he smoked while he aided the tailor in adjusting the straps. When he left the cell he still smoked the cigarette. He hopped up the steps of the scaffold and stepped on the trap, at the same time waving reading the death warrant. When the black cap was put over his head he spit the cigarette from his mouth. He died 11 minutes after the drop.

O'Neil was hanged for murdering an aged San Francisco saloon keeper whom he had held up.

Fire Causes Idleness.

Portland, Jan. 6.—The destruction of the Union Meat Company's plant here Wednesday has thrown 200 people out of employment and many of the families can ill afford to lose the salaries at this season of the year. The company will rebuild on a larger scale, but work can not begin until spring.

Portland Markets Firmer.

Portland, Jan. 6.—The livestock market has enjoyed a much firmer tone for the past three days on account of the colder weather. Sheep and hogs are especially stronger and cattle are in more steady demand than was expected, following the destruction of the Union Meat company's plant.

Kills Child With an Axe.

Everett, Jan. 6.—Frederick W. Soper, of this city, accidentally killed his 4-year-old son last evening with an axe. The child was swinging near where the father was splitting wood, when it stumbled and fell across the chopping block, the axe sinking into its brain. The father is insane with grief.

Eleven Tourists Frozen.

Milan, Jan. 6.—It is reported that 11 Swiss tourists have been frozen to death while making an ascent of Mount St. Bernard.
