Ashwood Prospector "Lambasts"
Prineville.

It is the hit dog that howls, and so
far the only real loud wail over county
division has come from Prineville.
And we believe that Prineville will
really hate to lose those portions of
Crook county which are asked for in
the creation of Jefferson county.

Why shouldn't she? They send an-
nually to Prineville, numbers of their
citizens who would have no business
at that place were county relations
severed, and of course Prineville
grieves over the prospective loss of
this business.

It is nothing to those strenuous
kickers against county division, that
the portions of Crook county which
asked to be merged in the new county
market their products in one direction
and when they have county busi-
ness to transact, must take a day's
ride further into the interior in an-
other direction, in order to reach their
county seat.

It is nothing to the Prineville
kickers that every taxpayer in North-
ern Crook county is paying two and
a half mills for the support of a
high school at Prineville, and that
when this portion of Crook county
wants a bridge over Trout creek, or
repairs made upon its county roads,
the work has to be done largely, if
not entirely, by private subscription.

It is not surprising that "Prine-
ville Hog" is an expression which
has become common throughout
Crook county, and many people are
beginning to believe that such an ani-
