### PORTLAND THREATENED.

Marine Commission Advises Mail Subsidies for Orient. Portland Oriental commerce, which is just taking form under the fostering attention of combined Oregon interests, is threatened in a startling manner by the program of the merchant marine commission if a seemingly inspired forecast is accurate. It is rumored that the body will advocate mail subsidies, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Most of the disbursements of this class will be on the Atlantic, but four lines are to be so favored on the Pacific, with Seattle and San Francisco decided on as terminals. Two more have been left on the unassigned list, but it is predicted that they will connect a United States Pacific port with South America, and may possibly run to Manila. Portland is not mentioned as even a possibility, and her connection with the Orient by subsidized lines, such as are promised her two rivals, is emphatically ignored. In the Pacific states the Oriental commerce overshadows all other commercial considerations. South American connections would be nothing in comparison. A subsidized line to Manila would partly compensate, and were this assured Portland instead of more direct connection with China and Japan, there would be less complaint.

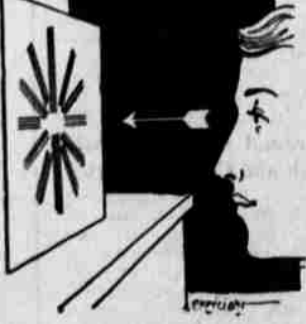
#### Sentenced for Life.
